

#### **RABBI'S RESPONSA**



Shalom All,

At the risk of posing the famous Zen koan, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?" we have a conundrum that shows up in the Torah this month.

It's a bit complicated, but in the 31st chapter of Exodus, Moses instructs Betzalel, the architect of the traveling prayer space, to construct it starting with all the ritual holy items: the ark, the menorah and the altar. Later, he provides Betzalel with the instructions for the outer walls. But in Chapter 36, Betzalel begins the construction of the tabernacle and reverses the process. Seemingly backwards, he creates the outer walls and structures, and only after that, concludes by making the functional elements to go inside. Which was supposed to come first: the outer walls or the inner ritual items?

Our medieval teacher par excellence, Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki (aka Rashi, d. 1105), notices the reversal in construction and imagines a conversation between the two men, in which Moses questions Betzalel, who responds by stating, "In the world, it is customary to build the home first and only afterward to fill it with furnishings." What a beautiful matter for us to consider here!

Rabbi Sholom Noach Berezovsky (aka. the Slonimer Rebbe, d. 2000) taught that Moses wasn't wrong here, he was simply focused on inner holiness. While Betzalel understood that, he still felt that before one can hope to attain inner holiness. they must ensure that the conditions are right externally. Used as a metaphor, we are being asked, "how should one approach their own personal growth and improvement?" Is it preferable to start working on a beautiful inside leading to an improved exterior? Or, should one begin by creating a suitable environment which will provide the context for developing inner purity?

Let me bring this back into the real world. You and I and everyone around us are on personal journeys. Sometimes we're moving forward, sometimes backward and a lot of the time, we're sort of just coasting along and running down the clock. But what if this is a moment when you are ready to decide that it is time to jump back in to focusing on your own growth. Where will we see the most impact? If we make a commitment to inner focus and dedication to a change and then watch our lives follow along the way Moses suggested? Or perhaps we follow Betzalel's approach and have to set in place the external realities which can lead us toward our goals.

In January, I was deeply grateful to have the ability to use some time during my sabbatical to change my surroundings. Like all the people I know, I had gotten buried in the demands of the world and my busy life. Taking a few days of silence alone in a cabin on a mountaintop in upstate NY provided me with the needed change in my external conditions that gave me the space to focus on my internal work.

I won't suggest that everyone needs to go on a spiritual quest looking for inner holiness, but if it's something you're considering, I certainly won't talk you out of it. You can take smaller, more readily available steps to capture the value that I'm describing. You need only take a look around and identify the moments, spots and conditions that provide the most soothing, safe and spiritual environment and then commit to spending more time in that space. Try it and see what happens.

And, if nothing else, at least this short time we have spent together has finally laid to rest the timeless chicken and egg debate. You're welcome.

I am in between two significant *tikkun olam* trips this month. I have just returned from a Civil Rights Journey organized by the Greenwich and Stamford Jewish Federations. We started our journey at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta and got lucky in that U.S. Senator and Reverand Raphael Warnock was preaching that Sunday morning! He is a powerful orator. And although he did not use the words *tikkun olam*, he was speaking

to us about how it is not enough to just listen and sit on the sidelines. We have to commit to do acts of charity and justice. Here at Temple Sinai, we have a strong tradition of caring for those in need.

I am limited here by wordcount, but would love to share with all of you what I learned on the rest of our journey to Montgomery, Selma and Birmingham. No matter how much you think you know about the Civil Rights movement, there is always more to learn. And, I hope that we all strive to reconcile what we have learned about the past with how we want our future to unfold. In about ten days, I will be on my way to Nepal with Temple Sinai's BuildOn Trek Team to help build a school in the western part of Nepal near the Indian border. This trip will be Temple Sinai's third BuildOn trek, but it will be my first.

I look forward to sharing what I have learned and experienced when I return! Until then, we will continue to pray for the safe return of all of the hostages in Gaza.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE VP OF SOCIAL ACTION



If you are ever feeling down and out and need something to help you feel better, I personally recommend doing something for someone else. How do I know this works? It's simple.

The Temple Sinai community has been

engaging in this ritual for years. We as a, kehillah kedoshah, look out for each other and in turn we feel personally uplifted. It is a simple human recipe that works every time!

I have spoken with so many congregants who may require additional support in a time of personal crisis. Our community rises to the occasion to help those in need.

The war in Israel has left so many of us distraught and feeling helpless! Instead of remaining in this state, as a Jewish community, we need to ask: "What can we do?" Many of us donated clothing, wrote letters to our local politicians, and participated in creating a video to send good wishes to our sister city of Afula. Even though we can't all fly to Israel to volunteer, being able to support our brothers and sisters makes us all feel better.

Over the last couple of months several congregants have needed our support due to personal illness or injury. Sinai members offered to give rides to physical therapy appointments, prepare and deliver meals, or just make a phone call to cheer someone up. The conversations and connections that people created were priceless. You can't buy the feeling you receive from helping another human being.

On January 31, several members donated their time shopping, cooking, and serving at Pacific House, a shelter for men located in Stamford. There were so many connections created that week. I loved the conversations I had with everyone involved, whether it be around the actual day or what was occurring in their personal lives. Nothing compared with walking into Pacific House and connecting with the men there; it was priceless. I can't tell you how many times they thanked us for providing them with food or said, "God bless you." Everyone who helped serve that evening was overwhelmed with the feeling of love and thankfulness. Maybe they were grateful for the lives they led, or thankful for the feeling they experienced from the connections they had just achieved. It was an overwhelming experience for everyone involved.

So many of us become wrapped up in our busy lives. I am also guilty of this, by the way. Giving of yourself to someone else provides one with the privilege of stepping out of your personal world and learning about someone else's daily challenges. It is an unexplainable feeling that one can only understand if you allow your heart and mind to reach out to other human beings.

I am grateful every day that the sacred work of being cantor also fulfills my creative and spiritual soul. I feel so blessed to bring people together in prayer and song.

In addition to the "typical" facets of my role as cantor,
Temple Sinai has encouraged me to bring some of my other loves to our community as well. My Sinai Circle, Poetic License, lifts up creative writing, as we study liturgy and write original interpretations of the prayers. And Zentangle, a meditative artform that I teach, is an outgrowth of my love for the visual arts. If you've never tangled with me before, I invite you to give it a try and join me for our upcoming online series which will run on Wednesdays, March 6, 13 and 20.

In addition to drawing and painting, I am also passionate about making things with my hands. I love to do needlepoint, build dollhouses, and craft with just about anything I can get my hands on! For Shabbat Your Way, Purim edition, coming up on Friday, March 22, I'll be hosting another Art Beit Midrash, a creative art

class rooted in our Jewish traditions.
Because we're celebrating Purim, our class will focus on masks. What masks do we wear in our lives? What does a mask conceal? What can a mask portray? We'll explore these ideas and then, using various beautiful arts and crafts supplies, we'll create our own unique masks from scratch.

I am excited to continue combining our Jewish traditions with various modes of creative expression, and I'm thrilled we're on this journey together.

To conclude, I want to leave you with a quote that fellow Zentangle teacher and knitting enthusiast, Nan Gordon, shared with us last month at our half-day Zentangle retreat. The author Toko-pa Turner writes, "When you learn to make things with your hands, you begin to awaken an awareness of the beauty and value of things in your life. Handmaking

teaches us about slowness: the antidote to brevity and efficiency. It shows us, through the patience and skillfulness of our own hands, what goes into a thing. When we put those efforts into bringing beauty into the world, we are honoring that which made us by creating as we have been created. We are taught to respect the slow, attentive piecing together of the life we yearn for. [Step by step], we apprentice the craft. We work in tandem with mystery, feeling its rhythms awaken in our bone memory. As the hands work, the mind is stilled and a greater listening is engaged as we drop down into the deep rhythm of devotion, where the whole world is in communion. The ferns unfurl, the daffodils trumpet, the rosebuds fatten, and the song of creation can be heard."

The ECEC at Temple Sinai was excited to start the new year. We had two new babies join our infant room which meant that two children from our infant room moved into our toddler room. We are continuing to grow and it is so exciting to be part of this adventure.

All the children enjoyed going outside and playing in the snow. Temple Sinai is on a beautiful piece of land and we enjoy using all parts of it. We used the playground to build

snowmen and used our bodies to slide down the hill on the snow. We even built a snow train and had fun riding it to nowhere!

During the winter, it's always fun to learn about hibernation. One of the classes built a cave out of a very large cardboard box. Some of the pictures they used were animals that hibernate and they talked about what animals they were sharing the cave with that day. What a great learning experience. The cave became their favorite place. They read books there, rested there, and took turns having their snack in the cave.

Year (this festival celebrates the beginning of a new year on the traditional lunisolar Chinese calendar) and they were kind enough to come in and share stories, show us traditional clothing and pass out red envelopes that are usually filled with money.

Groundhog Day is always fun to recognize. Several classes spent the week talking about the significance of this day. Lots of learning is happening, what is a groundhog, what does a groundhog look like, what is a shadow, how do we make a shadow with our body? Groundhog Day was Friday, February 2. We started the day having Shabbat with Rabbi Jay and then watched on the big screen as Punxsutawney Phil came out of his cave and picked the scroll that would tell us if he saw his shadow or not. #### **EDUCATION**



Thanks to the support of Rabbi Jay and the Temple Sinai leadership, I had the opportunity to attend my professional organization's annual conference in Memphis, Tennessee, in January.

This was my first conference with the Association of Reform Jewish Educators (ARJE) and the Early

Childhood Educations Association (ECE-RJ). For the first time in the conference's history, we were joined by our Early Childhood Education Center colleagues to be inspired by the history of civil rights and racial inclusion in our work. The conference started to get us thinking about embracing and encouraging diversity in our work. Not only by who is sitting in our classrooms/ programs but also by what other information we choose to include to complement our existing curriculum. What I learned and experienced at the conference deeply affected me personally and professionally. It was the first time in a long time that I saw a woman in a leadership role at a Jewish conference who had similar features to my daughter, who is interracial, and represented the

diversity of our religious school students and teens. Hearing about her first-hand experiences in her Jewish communities was informative and deeply troubling. We had the opportunity to visit the Civil Rights Museum, which is housed in the Lorraine Hotel, where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was murdered. The visit was profoundly moving, especially now. During this time in our world, there are many people standing up for justice and what they believe in, just as Dr. King did.

One of the most significant benefits of attending a conference is connecting with colleagues. It sparked many conversations amongst friends and colleagues between sessions, meals, and while we toured Memphis. I returned with deeper connections to colleagues old and new as well as new tools to bring to our faculty and students. I look forward to attending in the future.

"I do not ask the wounded person how he feels, I myself become the wounded person," states Walt Whitman.

Anthropologist Margaret Mead was once asked what she considered the first sign of civilization in a culture. She

didn't talk about laws, fishhooks, clay pots, or fire. She spoke about the first time someone broke their leg and then was healed. She explained that in the animal kingdom breaking your leg is a death sentence as you can't feed yourself or protect yourself. A broken leg that is healed is evidence that someone took the time to tend to the hurt partybrought them to safety, fed them, bound the wound and watched the miracle of healing. Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts, according to Mead.

Fortunately, at Temple Sinai, we have a thriving community, which would neatly match Mead's definition of a civilization, most notably characterized by our Caring Committee. Our Caring Committee nurtures those most in need by delivering food, managing rides, picking up medicine, and being present, among many other things. Our "wounded" feel supported and watched over by the generously spirited volunteers of Sinai.

While the Caring Committee is active, we have a need for more help. It seems a tsunami of affliction has crashed upon our Temple Sinai family. In the week that I am writing this, I have spoken to congregants who have had pneumonia, COVID 19, the flu, RSV, knee surgery, shoulder surgery, blood flow issues, sinus surgery, cancer,

two congregants had hip surgery, and of course general anxiety regarding the world at large. There are opportunities available to lift a fellow congregant up during a period of distress. Can there be any higher purpose?

Whitman said "the habit of giving only enhances the desire to give." We are the best versions of ourselves when we commit a selfless act. Unsung Heroes at Temple Sinai

Have you ever wondered... who takes care of all the setups and breakdowns at the Temple? At our High Holy Day

Services, we have approximately 750 chairs set up in the sanctuary. After some Friday night Shabbat services when we have our community oneg, who makes the coffee and sets up the tables? On Third Fridays, our Shabbat services are held in the Greenberg Family Chapel with a traditional setup. Maybe you have attended a Staying Connected program that takes place in the Chapel and the setup is completely different. Board meetings are held in the Chapel with tables in a rectangle shape to seat 25. Our Ruach service has a different setup with all the musical equipment needs.\* On First Fridays, we have our Families with Young Children Shabbat Service in the Chapel, and for again for a different setup. Our first Saturday of the month Avodat HaLev Meditative service, also in the Chapel, is also different. A few evenings each week there is some program, meeting, or Circle at Temple Sinai and each requires a different setup.

Our Religious School meets on Sunday mornings and utilizes most of our classrooms. They have Family Chavurah programs for each grade that are scheduled throughout the year. These take place in either Kid's Zone, the Social Hall or sometimes off-site. Cantor Micah has RuJu (Ruach Jr.) on Sunday mornings in the Chapel. Larry coordinates a Grade Level Pizza Lunch that happens on scheduled Sundays. These all require special setup needs.

We have our ECEC program with totally different daily demands from setups and cleanups (you never know when a child is going to have an accident and where).

So back to my question... how does this all happen? Well, the answer is Max Cordero, who is the most "unsung" hero of Temple Sinai. Well, at least in my eyes. Max has been at Temple Sinai since December 2009. I can always rely on Max. The setups will be done properly for each program/service/event and then when I come in on a Monday morning, the Temple will be back to "normal." Max knows the building (almost) as well as I do. He knows the ins and outs. Max and his family live on-site so we have the benefit that when something happens, he is right there to


call me and let me know. Many times, Max will send me a text and photo that he has already "fixed" the issues if he is able.

were citizens or not. Clarren researches her own family history, engages in extensive conversations with Lakota people and a rabbi to share this untold history. With her powerful book, Clarren not only shares this hidden history, but continues to "pursue justice, to repair the world, to take responsibility for our part."

Friday, April 26 is the Annual Sisterhood Shabbat. This is a special evening when the Sisterhood plans the service with Cantor Micah. We lead the service and celebrate women's friendships, spirituality, and Judaism. Sisterhood also sponsors the delicious Oneg. 
