

RUJU (TEMPLE SINAI'S AFFECTIONATE TERM FOR "RUACH JUNIOR") REBOOT!

RuJu is our children's musical ensemble for religious school students in $1^{\rm st}$ through $5^{\rm th}$ grade. This year, we will have two RuJu cohorts – $1^{\rm st}$ and $2^{\rm nd}$ graders (Ruach Junior, Junior!) and $3^{\rm rd}$ through $5^{\rm th}$ graders. If children elect to join RuJu, they will join Cantor Micah for rehearsal instead of attending Sunday morning services, every other week. On the alternating weeks, RuJu singers will then help to LEAD their Sunday service. Don't worry, we'll send out a schedule so it will be clear!

RuJu's goals include making beautiful music and learning about Jewish prayer. Most importantly, the members of RuJu enjoy being part of a musical community of children, singing together and enjoying their Judaism through music. REEL THEOLOGY – A TRIBUTE TO RABBI EUGENE B. BOROWITZ, Z"L

February 2024 would have seen the celebration of Rabbi Borowitz', z'l 100^{th} birthday and we will celebrate the impact he made on Temple Sinai, on 50 years' worth of rabbinical and cantorial students at HUC, and on the entire world of 20^{th} century Jewish thought. At the end of his tenure at the seminary, he was teaching a wildly popular course known as Reel Theology in which students pre-watched movies with important implications for our system of beliefs and then discussed it together. We will do the same this morning in the Shabbat Morning Bible Study group – one name in his memory and on which he made a lasting impact. The movie we will watch is called *Don't Look Up* and is available on Netflix (at time of publish) or for rent.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT AT TEMPLE SINAI

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Beginning in our Pre-K program, the goal of our Religious School is to teach students about the tapestry of Jewish life. Finding the right place to make a spiritual home for one's family is crucial, and we encourage families to get to know us before making that sort of commitment. For that reason and thanks to the generous funding from the Larry Cohen Fund, we offer free enrollment for our Pre-K and Kindergarten to any member or non-member family.

In addition to Sunday classes, students in 3rd through 6th grade also participate in the Remote Hebrew Learning program. Students learn in pairs or a small groups depending on their Hebrew level. The language component is highly individualized.

In 7th grade (or one year before celebrating becoming B'nei Mitzvah, whichever comes first), students continue to participate in Sunday classes, and also individual weekly sessions for their B'nei Mitzvah prep. Our process of preparation for this rite of passage is not one-size-fits-all. All aspects of the process are personalized and we are confident we can help each student celebrate in the best possible way.

TS INSPIRE

Temple Sinai has a rich history of confirming teens at the end of their 10th grade year. The Confirmation and Post-Confirmation programs include our Madrichim program (teen assistants in Religious School classrooms).

Our goal is to continue to build our teen community one point of engagement at a time. Students are told they will go to religious school and participate in the B'nei Mitzvah experience. Now Temple Sinai TS Inspire provides the opportunity to commit on their own. We encourage you to talk with your teen(s) about the meaning of Confirmation and/or being a part of our community. We hope they will continue to build on their Jewish education by joining us for learning and fun.

Here are a few examples of what participation in TS Inspire might look like for a teen on the path to Confirmation or who may be interested in youth engagement. Our goal is to allow teens to step in and out of activities based on their interests and schedules and to create an engagement plan that appeals to them. This includes, but is not limited to:

- A madrich who regularly works on Sunday mornings and joins Rabbi Jay for Schiff Tichon Sinai as their schedule allows.
- A teen who regularly participates in Hitnadvoot (volunteering) and SoSTY events.
- A teen who participates in various TS Inspire programs as their schedule allows.
- A teen who only attends Schiff Tichon Sinai sessions with Rabbi Jay and the Philadelphia trip.

SCHIFF TICHON SINAL

Led by Rabbi Jay

Schiff Tichon Sinai is a program that allows students in 8^{th} – 12^{th} grades to experience joy in Jewish learning, pride in being Jewish, and a commitment to participation in Jewish life. When our teens remain connected to Temple Sinai, they learn about Jewish life by actively experiencing it. Schiff Tichon Sinai combines the best of classroom-based and experiential education in a program fostering Jewish identity development and community-building.

The goals of the program are to meet students where they are – to provide appropriate challenges for growth, to build leadership among our teens, to give them ownership of their learning, to provide multiple points of entry into Jewish life and to promote Jewish identity formation. Most of all, it brings our kids together to have fun!
