EQUALITY IN PAID FAMILY LEAVE

As I write this bulletin article, I am full of joy and gratitude. Not only did Jill and I have a second beautiful, healthy daughter, but we were so touched by the warm welcome that Esti was given by our community at our communal celebration baby naming ceremony.

My family was also moved by the resolution that was passed recently by the Central Conference of American Rabbis and adopted by Kol Ami's Board of Trustees granting all employees who have worked at the synagogue longer than a year, a full 12 weeks paid family leave.

I will be honest, when this resolution was first passed, I asked the movement, "Should this apply to me? After all, my wife is the one giving birth, I am not." The Central Conference of American Rabbis explained to me that they especially wanted men to take leave. On top of assisting my wife in her recovery and bonding with my daughter, this resolution was the result of a couple of painful realizations.

For starters, the United States is the only country out of 41 developed nations, according to the World Bank and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, to not offer any paid family leave (most of the countries on the list offered at least 20 weeks).

Secondly, a compensation study by the Reform Movement showed that despite the progressiveness of the movement, female rabbis were still being paid less than their male counterparts in comparable positions. I've heard from female colleagues in my age demographic about how they were often asked in interview settings with concern about when they were planning to have children and would need to go on maternity leave. In having talks with female rabbis, it was determined that the way we could move forward to make employment opportunities and compensation equitable was by requiring male rabbis to take the same length of time in family leave.

Aside from cherishing this time with my family, helping Jill, and bonding with Esti, I am proud of this step our synagogue is taking to ensure that my daughters and other women will one day live in a society where they are not denied opportunities or equal pay because they are women. I hope that other companies and organizations will follow in the example that our synagogue and other Reform and Conservative synagogues are demonstrating across the country—not only giving men the opportunity to learn to father, but creating a more equitable environment for women in the workplace to be able to succeed without being penalized for having children.



OUR OFFICE & MEMBERSHIP DIRECTOR, LISA KAUFMAN

Hopefully by the time you read this article it will start looking and feeling like springtime in Utah. This year might have been off to a cold start, but Kol Ami has been fired up with many of our familiar in person programming returning and some exciting new programs too! It has been wonderful to see new members connecting with our community, moving services led by Rabbi Spector and Cantor Brown-Levy and fun, holiday celebrations. Shout out to my fellow Pink Ladies from Purim.

Spring also celebrates a time of renewal... here that means membership renewal! We are so glad you have chosen to become part of our Kol Ami family and look forward to sharing more experiences together in the coming year. We've increased our program and service offerings so there's something for everyone from our littlest tots to our distinguished seniors.

In May, you will receive an invoice that will include your new 23/24 balance for upcoming dues, tuition, and fees. It is important to note that dues currently account for only 40% of our annual operating budget. Like many other businesses, our costs of operation have increased dramatically with higher costs for supplies,

increased staffing and maintenance, and so on. As a result, on your statement you will notice a 5% increase in dues, which is actually lower than the current rate of inflation. We were able to keep our dues increase lower due to the continued support and generosity of our members along with a concerted effort to expenses wherever possible.

As an incentive we are offering a 10% discount on your dues if you submit your renewal form (only required if you have any update changes, i.e. new phone number, email, address), along with a minimum 25% deposit of your 23/24 dues, tuition, and fees by June 15th.

Your consistent payments help us to manage our budget and continue to offer programming and resources for our members. We'd like to encourage you to set up an auto pay plan. We can set you up for monthly payments from your credit card or ACH payments from your bank. This allows you and Kol Ami to better plan our monthly budgets. If you are already set up on a credit card or debit card auto payment plan, no action is needed.

GABRIEL KNOX, JUNE 24TH





We have enjoyed some wonderful and unique programs and events the past several months.

Our marvelous **Tu B'Shevat Seder** was led by Cantor Brown-Levy. We were able to participate, try different fruits, drink four cups of wine, eat a lovely dinner, and enjoy each other's company.

We had the honor to **host a** delegation from Azerbaijan, due to the generosity of the Stirling Foundation. We heard from Sheikh Ul-Islam Allahshukur Pashazade who is the head of religious figure of Muslims in the Caucuses, as well as 14 others including Melih Yevdayev the head of religious community of the Mountain Jews. Rabbi Spector had enlightened discussions with the delegration in addition to sharing experiences from his visit to Azerbaijan and the Red Town, known as the last remaining Shtetl in the world (located in Quba district). 



I'm writing to further thank Kol Ami and its staff again and again—and so many people for making this service possible and so wonderful. I also want to recount my wife's Jewish life and relationship with this community, of what was left unsaid or not made clear.

THANK YOU

Thank you, Kol Ami and members, for opening your doors to our family, friends, and mourners. Thank you Kol Ami staff, for all your time and work in planning, staging, preparing, rearranging plans, tables, and chairs, and cleanup. Thank you Galit Livne, Lisa Kaufman, Lexi Atkinson, Tamara Kipper, Tracy Plotkin, William Calderon, and Paul Thompson. And thank you Larry Stensrud for catering the delicious food. Everyone liked it. So much work for 400 people! Such support for us! And thank you all for welcoming so many guests. My family and I could not have been happier with the event. It was a real honor to my wife and a blessing to us. Thank you, Rabbi Spector, for your guidance, understanding, words, and care, and Cantor Brown-Levy for your music and prayers. Thank you, Danny Burman, for all you did to host,

accommodate, direct, be there, and oversee so many details, from streaming to beaming.

It was impeccably done with such friendliness and spoke volumes to the community about how great Kol Ami is and what it stands for—for all our people. I am forever appreciative and proud of this great place.

Thank you to my children Sally Taylor, and Maggie for help with planning, programs, and table settings (i.e., frames for the pictures, vases for the flowers) and thank you to my children's friends who helped and supported them, staged tables, and broke them down afterward. Thank you, Avery, my son, for your fortitude, expertise, and many hours putting together the slide show and music, and to your friend Tom Diamond for sound, projection, and equipment.

Thank you to the speakers: my children, Deb's friends, Steve Hoffman, Marsha Smith, and Debra Scott; musicians Joel Rosenberg, Tom Smart, Tim Meehan, and Aaron Peterson; and Sifi Toni Lock for your needful meditation to start things off.

Thank you to the many donors to Kol Ami in memory of Deb supporting Kol Ami and some of the costs of this function as well.

DEBRA & JUDAISM

Deb chose to be a Jew shortly after our marriage in 1979, in order to know how we would

raise our children. We then attended conversion classes with Rabbi Eric Silver. She took to it so naturally.

Judaism gave her a feeling of family, safety, freedom, nurturance, acceptance, and love. She embraced it and found a home here. She relished monthly in its great holidays and rituals, hosting Seders for our large family, setting a warm exquisite table for everyone with plenty of her rich charoset and all else that goes into the meal. She adored sharing Chanukah stories, playing games, reading stories with the kids, and making plenty of latkes.

Deb learned the prayers and songs.

And she did all she could to plan, prepare, and celebrate our children's b'nai mitzvahs for all three of them, enlisting Millie Nelson to help. It was monumental. Debbie never did anything by halves.

Deb was recognized by Kol Ami for "Service Above and Beyond" for the Parent Cooperative Program at Kol Ami in May 1997.

On June 18, 1998, she entered the eternal covenant between G-d and the people of Israel. She declared and affirmed that covenant after doing the work; a Beit Din, a thorough cleansing, and proper mikvah. She happily, permanently converted to Judaism with the following oath, "I choose to become a Jew of my own free will. I accept Judaism to the

exclusion of all other religions..." before Rabbi Wenger, witnessed by Bert and Lois Spiegel, Avery, Sally, and Maggie, Lynn Wimmer, Lili Field, and Mazal Peterson. The delay in making her conversion official was perhaps that she considered herself a Jew all that time and so did everyone else, but by Avery's upcoming bar mitzvah, the realization rightfully surfaced that it needed to be properly sanctioned and observed.

She was given the Hebrew name of Devorah Deneb. Deneb an Arabic word, in a Semitic language, it means "tail." Deneb is the tail of Cygnus, the Swan constellation. Deneb is a supergiant blueishwhite star of the first magnitude, the northernmost brightest star of Cygnus. It is also the biggest and by far the most distant star in the prominent Summer Triangle. It too is part of a second asterism, (i.e., the Northern Cross) and further Deneb will eventually become our Pole North star. Deneb no doubt is eponymous for Deb, very fitting for our Jewish star watcher, bird-lover, and conservationist whose name she first took for herself early in our marriage. But I always called her Deb, Debbie, or maybe Debra if I happened to be very upset at her. It happens.

Deneb then served as chair of the Mitzvah Network and according to Geri Siegel, innovated an effort to write personal cards to people in need and originated sending gift bags to people shut in their homes.

She also served with our Chevra Kaddisha, preparing, cleaning, purifying, protecting, and watching over the body before the burial.

She was designated and celebrated as a Volunteer of the Month in March 2008, and as such, her biography was fully told then and submitted by Betty Yanowitz the in the May/June 2008 Voice of Kol Ami stating, in part, "Always modest, Debra Sandack... lives by the words of Geri Siegel, who observed that 'Every member of Kol Ami a member of the Mitzvah network.' Deb truly believes that doing a mitzvah should be a daily part of her life, not something reserved for a 'Mitzvah Day.' Whether organizing the assembly and delivery of Chanukah and Rosh Hashanah bags for seniors, working in the gift shop or with the blood drives, visiting the homebound, preparing meals for those in need, delivering items collected in the Mitzvah Crib or instigating the Neighborhood Nosh, her energy and enthusiasm are endless as she continues to be an inspiration to others...'

Indeed, this was Deneb, always ready and happy to do her part for someone in need, at the very moment of realizing it should be done, she did it, with a friendly smile.

She took particular joy in Rosh Chodesh, about which she and many others wrote in tribute to Bert Spiegel, included in Remembering Bert, an edition created, collected, edited, and published by Jathan Janove—his touching memorial to Bert, available in its entirety online at: https://jathanjanove.com/wp-content/uploads/2018/08/Bert-Spiegel_Book_Final-condensed.pdf. Debra's words at page 22 are as follows:

An Angel Among Us

"Whenever I talk about love, acceptance, patience, thoughtfulness, true service work, mitzvot, the name Lois and Bert are in the same sentence. I am so grateful to have met Lois through the Rosh Chodesh group and so grateful that Bert invited my husband Art to Neshama. I know I am a better wife, mother, and human being because of Bert and Lois's influence. My heart/soul is healthier and happier, and my life is so much richer, having known them. I will carry this with me forever and I have told this story to my children many times. s/Devorah Deneb."

Her words about "love, acceptance, patience, thoughtfulness, true service work, and mitzvot," can be said about her, our angel, in the same sentence, as Debbie's names to be told and retold to her grandchildren about her loving playful, creative, beautiful grandmother.

TO CONCLUDE

Debra and I had a common G-d, a loving, joyful, and meaningful life together, and a giving religion to discover in Judaism. I thank her and Congregation Kol Ami for it all and all the dear people we found there along the way. At our wedding, we vowed to live side by side, and we did until tragically she died by my left side on July 22, 2022. Her absence from our lives is a palpable loss, and we mourn and regret it daily. She was such a blessing.

Students and parents will meet at the B'nai Israel East cemetery at 4:00 pm (next to the shed). At 5:00 pm parents will bring students back to Kol Ami once the burial is finished.

What is a genizah and why do we need to bury our sacred writings? Genizah means "reserved" or "hidden" in Hebrew, and is traditionally a place where Jews store sacred documents when they fall out of use. The general rule is that anything dealing with sacred subjects should be placed in a genizah, rather than thrown out. The Talmud stipulates that all sacred writings should be preserved in a place where they cannot be destroyed. This idea is closely tied to the prohibition from ever erasing G-d's name. Most synagogues clean out their genizah every few years, by burying the contents in a Jewish cemetery as a sign of reverence and respect



RABBI WENGER WONDERS

SHOULD WE
HAVE SYMPATHY
FOR THE
UKRAINIANS
CONSIDERING
THEIR
COMPLICITY
DURING THE
HOLOCAUST?

A student asked a perceptive question during one of our classes: "I know there's a lot of sympathy for the Ukrainians right now. As a child of Holocaust survivors, however, I can't dredge up much sympathy for the Ukrainians considering their complicity during the Holocaust and... as they shot us in the mass graves at Babi Yar. What do you think, Rabbi?"

A similar question was raised by Natan Shransky, well known prisoner of conscience in the USSR, now chairman of the Babi Yar Memorial. Here is my condensed portion of his response:

"Antisemitism is not something which was specific for Ukraine. Antisemitism is the most ancient hatred, which rises regularly whenever people need to hate the other. Even if you think about some nice places in the Alps in Switzerland, remember that the whole Jewish community was burnt alive in order to avoid plague there. If you enjoy traveling to Spain, the thing that you see is Ferdinand and Isabella who exiled half of the Jewish people. Think about Provence, a great place, think of what Crusaders did there. the terrible massacres of entire Jewish populations. If we Jews start building our relationship with the world on the basis of what they did

to us, we should move to another planet.

Rashi comments on the chapter when Hagar and Ishmael are sent to the desert, and Ishmael almost dies from thirst. He has no water and then G-d says to Hagar, 'Don't be afraid. I'll help your son as he is.' He helps Ishmael. The angels of the heavens revolt and say, 'You're helping him? Don't you know how many awful things his people will do to our people?' And G-d says to them, 'Now at this moment, is a child innocent or guilty?' And the angels say 'innocent.' G-d responds, 'So I'll judge everybody in his time and that's our way.'

Rashi suggests that we have to deal with people at this time. The people of Ukraine at this time have the lowest level of neo-Nazis in Europe. Half of the Ukrainian government is Jewish, and openly Jewish. Zelensky not only is speaking about his Jewishness, but about his deep love for Israel. Above all this, G-d, providence, history, has put Ukraine and its people in the unique position of being defenders of the free world. So let's judge Ukraine in this time, as G-d told us."

GRAVE MATTERS

WHY CHOOSE A JEWISH CEMETERY?

Our experience is that most Jews who opt for traditional burial want their final resting place to be a Jewish cemetery. This is true even if they are totally secular and have no involvement with a synagogue. In recent years, between 66% and 75% of local Jewish burials have been for people who were not members of Kol Ami.

What is it that makes a Jewish cemetery important to people as they leave their mortal lives? No one has expressed to us that they hope they will "get points with G-d" for doing things according to Jewish law or tradition at the end of their lives. One explanation may lie in the Hebrew terms defining cemeteries, which show us how our cemeteries fit with Jewish values and perhaps why people, even secular Jews, would choose one as a final resting place.

There are multiple Hebrew names for a cemetery: 1) Beit kevarot ("home of graves"); 2) Beit olam ("eternal home" or "house of the afterlife"); 3) Beit chayim ("house of the living"); and 4) Beit shalom ("house of peace"). Basic to Judaism, and implied in these names, is a belief that the soul has eternal life. Many believe that the soul, or nehama, has consciousness and awareness beyond this life. For this reason, Jews try to create the most respectful environment possible in a cemetery—for the sake of those buried there. In fact, some rules for visitors at Jewish cemeteries have been developed specifically out of respect for the resident souls.

For example, one should not wear *tzitit* (fringes) or study Torah in the cemetery because the departed souls are not able to participate in these *mitzvot* and we don't want to "shame" them. The same goes for eating, which the departed cannot do. We refrain from boisterous behavior, which might disturb the dead (along with their living visitors). The same notion that the deceased person still

has awareness or consciousness carries into the room when the members of the *chevra kadisha* perform *tahara* (ritual washing). Unlike the way those performing surgery on an anaesthetized patient may listen to music and carry on personal conversations, the atmosphere during *tahara* is solemn, respectful, and quiet.

Whereas in very early times, Jews were typically buried in family burial grounds, communal cemeteries were established long ago for practical reasons. In fact, when Jews arrive in a new place, it is always the first priority to establish a cemetery before building a synagogue. According to Jewish tradition, a cemetery is a place even more sacred than a synagogue and kippot are worn when visiting these sacred grounds. Having this common ground set aside for Jews allows people to be comforted by the thought that their soul will reside together with other Jewish souls with similar values. Many of us feel this same comfort in life when we come to a synagogue and mingle with the broad "family" of other Jews. The bottom line is that Jewish cemeteries are dignified places that exemplify simplicity, honor, and respectwhich is what most of us want for the dwelling place for our soul.

A different view—from aish.com: An old Jewish woman, on her 80th birthday, decides to prepare her last will and testament. She goes to the rabbi to show it to him and to ask him for advice on a few points; chief amongst them is her request that she not be buried in a Jewish cemetery.

"But why Mrs. Epstein?" the rabbi asks.

"You don't want to be buried with the rest of our people?"

"No," Mrs. Epstein said resolutely. "I want to be buried at Nordstrom."


"Nordstrom?!" the rabbi said in disbelief.
