NEW YEAR, NEW 4-3-2-1 CHALLENGE

We are now in September, which means that rabbis and cantors everywhere are gearing up for what we call "our Superbowl," Yom Kippur. The evening service that ushers in Yom Kippur is called "Kol Nidre," a service that is named after one of the prayers we recite that is among the most famous prayers in Judaism. Kol Nidre means "all vows," asking G-d to nullify the vows that we make that we have or inevitably will break. It is a beautiful and humbling prayer acknowledging that each and every one of us falls short not only of G-d's expectations for us, but our own expectations for ourselves.

Last year at the High Holidays, I issued a challenge to all of our congregants. In our over 100 Shabbat services (Friday night and Saturday morning) that we have a year, could everyone make it to four of them? In a year where we had a ton of programming thanks to the hiring of Galit Livne, could you make it to three social events? This past year with so many classes and the bringing in of an internationally best-selling author, did you find yourself at two adult education programs? Did you make it to one of our many social action events?

Last year, in response to this 4-3-2-1 challenge that I issued to the congregation, in which I asked the questions, "How often do you find yourself in synagogue and how

often do you find synagogue in you?" So many of you came up to me and said, "Four Shabbat services? I can do that! That's only once every three months, get ready to see me, Rabbi!" Yet, still we had services in which there was nobody standing for those whose names we read for Yarzheit. Many of the folks who told me they would accept the 4-3-2-1 challenge, I have not seen since last Yom Kippur. Did you make the most of being present for your community and faith, and did you find your community and faith present in you?

As I said, Kol Nidre is a time for us to acknowledge that we do not live up to the vows we make, but a way that we can make teshuva is by fulfilling that commitment, even if it is a year late.

In 5783, I was proud of everything Congregation Kol Ami was able to do, in 5784, make the most of us! Not only will being here add to your life metaphorically, it might add to your life literally! Did you know, that a study showed that people who regularly attend religious services are 55% less likely to die over an 18-year period? I hope to see you at Kol Ami this year and for years to come.

Rabbi Spector speculates that if you accept the 4-3-2-1 challenge in 5784, it could be your most fulfilling year you have had in quite a while! Shanah tovah!



THE FUTURE OF OUR WEEKDAY MINYANIM

For the arrival of this Cantor's Chorale I am hoping that everyone has enjoyed a Shanah Tovah Um'tukah—a good and sweet new year and holiday season.

I have been thinking about the variety of services we experience. Our congregation as a hybrid has a variety of service offerings—from Shabbat, to Holy Days, to Festivals, and, for over 50 years, our weekday minyan (quorum of 10), which currently takes place on Sunday, Monday, and Thursday mornings.

Before COVID and my arrival here, the minyan experience was well attended by a core of 10–20 regulars including Ira Tannenbaum. Those regulars were mainly retirees. When Ira passed away, the attendance dropped.

Since my arrival two years ago in the midst of COVID and beyond, there have been a variety of age demographics represented. We have had some young adults mixed in with empty nesters and seniors; and B'nai Mitzvah families have been added to the experience as well.

With these beautiful changes we still have faced a national challenge of the Conservative movement. No longer has the "obligation" of helping make a minyan been easy to sustain.

From the small communities to the larger ones, sustaining a weekday minyan has decreased, all around the country, to fit the needs of each community.

Here at Kol Ami, the existence of a complete minyan has been compromised. While we have about three to six regulars who have either lay-led or simply come to support this traditional liturgy, it has been a challenge to sustain the quorum we need for a complete prayer service.

This is not for lack of reaching out. My beloved minyanaires and I have tried numerous ways to accommodate our congregation. Since COVID it has been particularly challenging to get people to attend in person only. We have had a few complete minyanim here and there—but the attendance overall has been low. Even when a personal yahrzeit occurs, it takes great "strongarming" and pleading to get the needed quorum.

The times when we have been blessed to have our full minyan count have been for the attendance of our pre-Bar/Bat/B'nai mitzvah families. I was blessed to institute this requirement and our families have responded beautifully. The student comes into the Pepper Beit Midrash with their family the

Thursday morning before their big day and chants their Maftir portion in front of our typically "hybrid" minyan.

A note: this is not your "old fashioned" style minyan—we are a group of vibrant, energetic people who not only enjoy singing together often—traditional prayers—but engage in a brief, interactive Torah study as well. We welcome everyone from of every background—from Jews by choice to Intro to Jewish Life students—all are encouraged to attend, pray, and study together.

My question for our congregation is: what is to become of this many-decades old tradition?

Please make every effort to support us. We need you! Remember, regardless of your tradition or background, you are always welcome to attend.

Our minyanaires and I truly hope to see our weekday services stay alive here at Kol Ami.

With all of our new and long-standing members and great programs planned ahead, it's going to be an exciting year!







RABBI WENGER WONDERS

RENEWING THE PARTNERSHIP WITH G-D AND OUR WORLD

We follow the news: Hurricanes, typhoons, floods, heat waves, fires, blizzards, and avalanches. Our Great Salt Lake, the Dead Sea, and the world's glaciers continue their dangerous shrinkage. From Agent Orange and burn pits, cancers increase. Air quality deteriorates. Large scale death of humans, animals, and plants are an everyday occurrence.

The poor bear the brunt of this drastic change.

In a dry, scientific description, the earth's climate is changing and is projected to continue to change. The World Bank's Climate Change Portal joins National Geographic in understanding this transformation faster than at any point in known history. The rapidity of this climate change is primarily as a result of human activities.

Global warming crosses world regions and many sectors important to society, such as human health, agriculture, food security, water supply, transportation, energy, biodiversity, and ecosystems. The frequency and intensity of extreme high temperature events are virtually certain to increase in the future as global temperatures increase throughout most of the world.

In our Jewish world, meanwhile, we mark Rosh Hashanah as the creation of our world. In Genesis' rich words, "When G-d began to create heaven and earth—the earth being unformed and void, with darkness over the surface of the deep and a wind from G-d sweeping over the water—G-d said, 'Let there be light.'"

As our new year begins, we view the universe emerging from primordial chaos, Tohu va'vohu, as the Torah expresses it.

G-d's creation from tohu and bohu, unorganized mass, is an image of rational thought overcoming chaos and disorder, as Professor James Diamond summarizes. The goal of us humans is to follow this path. We are the final creation of an act of divine organization making our planet fit for us to thrive. We are charged to be partners in this divine, orderly creation.

Now, however, we are bent on regressing the cosmos back into its original chaos. We and our children are being swept along with the CO2 tide of our own making.

In Biblical terms, "G-d regretted having made humankind on earth. With a sorrowful heart, G-d said, 'I will blot out from the earth humankind whom I created—humans together with beasts, creeping things, and birds of the sky; for I regret that I made them.

All the fountains of the great deep burst apart, and the floodgates of the sky broke open, chaos once more replaced creation, as a painter whitens an imperfectly painted canvas."

All is not lost, however. The Biblical saga concluded with a promise to us flawed creatures, "Never again will I doom the earth because of humankind, since the devisings of the human mind are evil from youth; nor will I ever again destroy every living being as I have done.

So long as the earth endures, seed time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night shall not cease."

G-d is not to blame for our present environmental disaster, says Torah. Our own 'devisings are evil' by themselves. James Baldwin, quoting an old proverb, put it, "G-d gave Noah the rainbow sign. No more water. The fire next time."

What is to be done? We all know. We must renew the partnership with G-d and our world:

- Drive less.
- Fly less.
- Reduce, reuse, and recycle.
- Plant a tree.
- Use less electricity.
- Eat less meat.
- Support alternative energy sources.
- Insist our governments and corporations do the same.

Can we do it? Yes. Will we? A little. Enough? I wonder!



GRAVE MATTERS

MATZEVOT (JEWISH GRAVESTONES) 101

Once upon a time, the customers of companies making Jewish gravestones were exclusively the surviving family or friends of deceased loved ones. Today, in addition to these traditional customers, people who are very much alive but who want to participate in some or all phases of preparing their own headstone have joined the ranks of monument company customers. Some reasons why people may want to design and even purchase their own headstone are: 1) to guarantee that a monument will be erected, even if family is out of town or non-existent; 2) to remove burdens from survivors; and 3) to control the monument's content. Whether you are a survivor or are doing pre-need planning for yourself, the following information should help you to navigate this new realm that you have probably never dealt with before.

BASIC GUIDELINES: In our Kol Ami cemeteries, even if you design and purchase your monument pre-need, it may not be installed until the conclusion of the sh'loshim period (thirty days after burial). Double monuments may be installed thirty days after the burial of the first deceased person, and the still-living person may have all information engraved except (of course!) a death date. We require a non-metal monument along with a granite or concrete foundation around the base. Specific size and content requirements are listed in our Rules and Regulations document, which can be downloaded from our website: www.jewishcemeteryutah.org on the "Download Documents" tab. Monuments remain the property of the family, so repairs and cleaning over time remain the responsibility of the family. Starting with a stone that will hold up well and requires the least maintenance is the best idea.

In addition to the stone's design and content, you may need to decide whether it will be a single or double (for adjoining plots). In all cases, you will need to decide on the monument's material, the color, and the style.

SINGLE OR DOUBLE? Couples may want to have one stone that covers both plots, but they are welcome to each have an individual stone. Double stone pros: Family togetherness is the major 'pro' here—this may override the 'cons' because of the emotional appeal. Also, some people may engrave their marriage date, which would be strange on a single stone. Double stone cons: When the second

person passes, the stone will have to be moved so that the second plot can be opened. The family will need to make those arrangements with the monument company, including payment. Engraving relating to the person buried second is usually done on-site at the cemetery, and can be costly.

MONUMENT MATERIAL: Without a doubt, granite is the most popular material for a headstone, primarily because of its permanence, toughness, and weather resistance. An igneous rock, it will be the most durable stone available, is capable of being sculpted, and comes in many colors. Marble, which some people like for its appearance, is much softer; and the etchings and words in marble may eventually fade away because water can dissolve it over time. While we allow stones made of materials such as marble and sandstone, we recommend granite because eventually less durable stones will fail and the deceased may not have a marked grave.

COLOR: We have hard water in our cemeteries, and hard water stains more than soft water. Experience has shown that hard water stains are more evident on dark colors; this is why the most popular color is light grey in hard water areas. But families may either clean their stones themselves or have them professionally cleaned periodically by a monument company, so there is a remedy for choosing a color that might stain more easily. When you buy a stone, to avoid the disappointment of a stone with an


appearance that would upset the deceased, ask up front for advice on upkeep.

STYLE: The two main styles available are "flat" (also known as "flush") and "upright," with "slant" being a subset of "upright." There are a few rows in our three cemeteries that are specifically designated as "flat stone only" rows. If you select one of those rows, it will be stated on your contract. If you have chosen a row with no such restriction, monuments may be of any style including flat. Flat stones can be single or double. The larger the surface area, the thicker the stone should be—so that it will withstand the possibility of equipment passing over it. One downside of a flat monument is that when there is snow covering the ground, it will be hard to find. The benefit of upright stones is that they are easier to find and that water runs off the stone so that it never saturates the monument's letters.


Erecting a monument and unveiling it are the final steps we must take to honor our loved ones. The emotional component can be very difficult for survivors, which may delay the process. Another reality today is that our excellent local vendors are unable to provide monuments quickly—due to "supply chain" issues. Our best advice is to start working with a monument company as soon as you are able to handle it emotionally so that this mitzvah can be completed approximately one year after your loved one's passing.
