## ❖ From Our President's Desk Ira Helf

The Board of Trustees at Temple Isaiah meets every month. We had our first meeting of 2017 a few weeks ago, and there are some things that I would like to share with our Chai Lights readership. Many of you may know that Board meetings are generally not the most exciting things in the world. I believe that our



meetings are a bit more interesting as we have a passionate Board who are facing important issues. Here are some of the outcomes from our January meeting:

#### 1. Update on Fundraising

The current fiscal year began on July 1, 2016, and will end on June 30, 2017. In the first half of the current fiscal year (July 1 – December 31 2016) we had a substantial number of successful fundraisers. I will introduce this by saying that a few years ago the fundraising events at Temple Isaiah did quite the opposite of fundraising, by which I mean that in many cases we took a financial loss on the event. In the past two years we have figured out a more successful formula and almost every recent event has been profitable. This year is a shining example of that.

Our largest fundraisers in the past six months have been:

- The December 10<sup>th</sup> event at the Annenberg Theater, featuring a wonderful performance by Linda Lavin followed by a delicious buffet meal
- The installation of Rabbi Lazar in November, including the performance "Jews Do the Blues" featuring Deanna Bogart
- A "rummage sale" in our parking lot, which cleaned out a lot of people's garages, and also filled the garages of a whole new set of people

Each of these events brought in thousands, and sometimes tens of thousands, of dollars to Temple Isaiah. It's been a long time since we had such a string of successful events. We're all very grateful to the team of people who made them happen, including Carol Fragen, Vicki Miller, and Ron Martinez.

Profitable fundraising events might not change our financial situation enough to reverse the historical trend completely, but it does help us considerably in extending the amount of time we might be able to stay in our current building. For that reason, we are very appreciative of the participation and support by our congregation as well as the larger community in attending these events.

#### 2. Passover Seder

We had a long and fruitful discussion about setting the date for our Passover Seder. Both Rabbi Lazar and Doug Morton participated in the discussion with the full Board. Together we made the decision that this year our Seder will be on 1<sup>st</sup> night of Passover, Monday, April 10, 2017. More information about this will be available in the near future. I hope you will join us this year at our traditional Seder.

#### 3. Formation of Committees

The participation of many people is required for any synagogue to thrive. Ours is no exception. We believe that a structure of active committees make it easier for anyone to participate. In that effort, we have formed a slate of committees for 2017. If you have any interest in being on one or more of these, or would like more information, please contact Doug Morton or me. ## ❖ From the Rabbi's Study Rabbi David Lazar



At the time that Adam was created, God led him past every tree in the Garden of Eden and said to him, "See how beautiful and praiseworthy are My creations. Everything that I created, I have done so for you. Be careful not to damage or destroy My world, for if you damage it, there will be no one to clean up after your mess!"

(Midrash Kohelet Rabbah 7:13)

Awareness and appreciation of nature are an important part of everyone's life and all the more so out here in the desert. We live within touching distance of the impressive San Jacinto Mountains, with weather that enables us to be outside for most months of the year. We are reminded daily of "how beautiful and praiseworthy" God's creation is.

But we also know that we human beings have made a mess of that creation. Our earth, air and seas are plaqued by pollution. It is now agreed upon by the vast majority of climate scientists that climate change is a very real phenomenon and that greenhouse gasses, the byproduct of our energy needs provided by burning fossil fuels, are indeed the cause of what is happening to our weather. This leads to the erosion of coast lines, the flooding of islands and very likely to the drought that we have experienced in recent years. True, this winter has brought some very good news with nearly half of the state drought-free for the first time in six years. This is definitely a time to give thanks and celebrate blessings of what abundant water brings us. But it is also a time for us to be mindful of the damage done to the tree population of California by way of fire and harmful insects that the critical lack of water has inflicted upon the resilience of our forests.

Tu B'Sh'vat, the fifteenth day of the Jewish lunar month Sh'vat, coming up on February 10, is our calendar's way of encouraging us to set aside time to appreciate the blessings of nature and, in particular, trees - and consider how we interact with nature.

This date is first mentioned in the Mishnah (Rosh Hashanah 1:1) as "the new year for trees" and was simply a date of economic-religious importance in the realm of the

Torah's agricultural laws. One law, that of *orlah* (*Lev.* 19:23-25), stipulates that the fruit of a tree must not be eaten in the first three years after planting and that a special Temple offering be made in the fourth year. But according to rabbinic interpretation, instead of counting the years after the actual planting, as we would with someone's birthday, years are computed in a way that a tree planted on any day of the year before the 15<sup>th</sup> of Sh'vat, is thought of as one year old on that date, even if planted the day before. This is similar to paying tax on income we have earned on any day of the year before December 31<sup>st</sup>. This way of figuring

also applies to the various types of tithing of tree fruit (e.g. Deut. 14:22).

With time, as fewer Jews lived and farmed in the Land of Israel, and more lived in the Diaspora, observance of these laws diminished. It wasn't until after Jews began returning to the Holy Land, among them the 16<sup>th</sup> century Kabbalists of Safed, that this practice was brought back to life. These Jewish mystics created a ceremony in which different kinds of wine and fruits were used to symbolize the various "spheres" from which our universe is composed.

However, since Kabbalists were (and still are) a predominantly elite stratum of Jewish society, very few people actually celebrated this Tu B'Sh'vat ritual. And so, the date still remained quite peripheral in Jewish culture. It wasn't until Zionist school teachers in pre-State Palestine created a Jewish Arbor Day, complete with tree planting and reforestation of the Land, that the observance entered modern times.

In his groundbreaking work, *The Way Into Judaism and the Environment* (2006), Israeli environmental activist, Jeremy Benstein, points out that these stages in the historical development of this day on the Jewish calendar represent three aspects of human existence: 1) Economic, as found in the Laws of the Mishnah; 2) Spiritual, as reflected in the Kabbalistic Seder; 3) National-Political, which surfaces in early Zionist culture. He goes on to say that they all come together in the fourth stage of development which began in the 1970's, that of seeing Tu B'Sh'vat as the Jewish Earth Day:

Taken alone, each component can easily get out of whack: the economic can become merely utilitarian; the spiritual, overly abstract; and the national risks degenerating into chauvinism. The overarching contemporary environmental perspective provides a unifying synthesis for our time. (p. 181)

And how might we understand "a unifying synthesis" here in our community?

Tu B'Sh'vat in its earliest use, as a "new year" of sorts reminds us that as human beings, we need measured units of time in order to take stock of ourselves, what we've taken and what we must give back. On this date, we consider that give and take relationship with the land.

From a spiritual point of view, we look to trees, and the plant world in general, to teach us about ourselves. Just as trees reach down and draw water and minerals from the earth, so too we humans also have "roots,"

and that we seek, and actually need, nourishment from "the depths" – that is, our past, our heritage and our traditions. Much in the same way that trees need sunlight and moisture from the dew in order to thrive, we humans also strive to be open and refreshed from that which comes from a place that we often refer to as "above," the heavens, in the form of inspiration, awe and hope.

Our shared Jewish history and continued focus on the State of Israel's future - from a social, economical and security point of view - can also be examined through our observance of Tu B'Sh'vat. Many of us have planted trees in Israel, either literally with our hands or through the fundraising efforts of the Jewish National Fund. This is but one way to help build and maintain the modern Jewish State but it may not necessarily be the best way of doing so. Each of us must search out and find the ways most suited to our own ideologies and passions in order to show our advocacy and support for our brothers and sisters in Israel.

Finally, experiencing Tu B'Sh'vat as our own Earth Day helps us consider the intersection of our Jewish identities and our concern for the environment.

Among the issues that come to mind for us here in Palm Springs that are often talked about are water conservation and ensuring that we don't over build into areas of pristine nature. And there have been sucesses: for instance California, in general, and the Coachella Valley in particular, have led the way with both wind and solar energy alternatives to fossil fuels.

But there is still much to do. The Palm Springs City Council will soon have the opportunity to approve a new ordinance requiring that most newly constructed and significantly remodeled residential buildings be equipped with solar energy units. Details of this proposed regulation are still being worked out, such as long-term savings versus short-term building cost increases, impact on the building industry and affordable housing, etc. Nevertheless, this seems to be a good step forward.

It is a only a small step, but one that will send a message to other parts of the country. The message is that we can and should make efforts to begin to reverse the damage done by greenhouse gasses because, after all, there is no one to clean up our mess other than ourselves!
