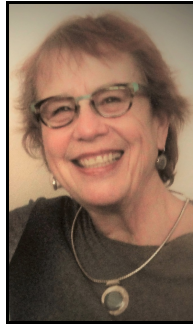

❖ *From the President's Desk* *Soo Borson, M.D.*

At this season, we ask you all to renew your membership – and for those of you not yet members, we love meeting you and hope you'll consider joining our community. And we ask renewing members to consider increasing your membership commitment this year, giving what you can in support of our synagogue and community center. Many of you are wondering: what exactly is Temple Isaiah? The answer is that Temple Isaiah is evolving – so there isn't just one answer. Here's a start.



Temple Isaiah is a 70-year old Jewish community in the process of transforming itself to function well in a new reality. What does this mean?

1. **Membership.** We all know that Jewish demography in the desert has changed radically over the decades, and other Jewish institutions have grown up as people moved eastward in the valley. Folks in the desert tell us they want their centers of Jewish life close to home, and it's this wish that we honor in our all-out effort to remain in Palm Springs. Less well known is that new people are always moving here – many from other parts of Southern California – in search of more affordable, manageable living. And many of these new Palm Springers are in the midst of their most productive career years and eager to put down roots. You are transforming our membership – and we welcome you!
2. **Spiritual practice and learning.** Our Rabbi Lazar is celebrating his third anniversary at Temple Isaiah next week. He understands all branches of Jewish observance, but some say he's "too Conservative (or Orthodox)," others that he is "too Reform," still others that he's "too kumbaya." Rabbis today have to understand how complicated congregations and their wishes can be! Rabbi Lazar has brought a high level of Jewish learning to his d'varim and the many new classes and lecture series he has developed here. His style of worship is inclusive, borrowing from his wide experience with Jewish life in several parts of the US, Israel, and Sweden and all branches of Jewish observance. His fearless embrace of other faith traditions enriches our experience here and helps us see how other faiths are our natural allies. All faiths encourage the search for ways to better ourselves as people, offer benchmarks for knowing how we're doing on this journey, and support us to form and function as caring communities.
3. **Governance.** I was surprised to learn recently that some of our members believe that officers and members of our Board of Trustees are paid. Some trustees wish they were, for sure! But no, this is volunteer service with extra responsibilities. Board members are elected by congregational vote after a nomination process that

happens in the fall, and serve 3-year terms (with an option to be re-elected for a second 3-year term). The Executive Committee is comprised principally of the officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer). Our governance structure needs to share in the transformational process that is moving through other parts of Temple Isaiah now, and the Board will address this need in the coming months.

4. **Volunteer workforce.** We are an under-funded institution with a paid staff of three (plus the Rabbi), only one full-time. We rely on the willingness of our members to take up many organizational responsibilities and routine, everyday tasks. And we rely on you to work as teams. In the past few months, our revitalized volunteer program has become an essential component of Temple Isaiah's transformation. We'll be looking to you for more good ideas and – even more crucial – the energy to help bring them to life.
5. **Partnership in service to community.** Our full name is the Louis and Florence Kitsis Jewish Community Center/Temple Isaiah. Embedded in the founders' vision was the notion of service to the community through the maintenance of a center for communal life. Early on, the Palm Springs Jewish community was large enough to sustain a strictly Jewish place – but no longer. To honor Judaism's and our founders' vision of service, we must turn our sights to the wider community in which we live. Though famous for the immense privilege (and often fame) of many residents of our region, our valley is home to even more under-resourced communities whose endemic disadvantage limits the prospects of many of their most promising people. We can and must use the assets of our building – which is just too big for us alone, and too expensive – to honor our Jewish commitment to repairing the world. This is what our dreams of a substance use rehabilitation program and a community kitchen are all about. In serving others, we also serve ourselves. Partnership.

These are some of the elements of our transformation. That's not all – we are experiencing, individually and sometimes collectively – the *symptoms* that usually come along with the process: a sense of loss (of what was and cannot be again); fear (of what might, or might not, come to pass); a general sense of unease; anger, and for some, a feeling of betrayal and a desire to blame someone. The truth is that the pace of change in human institutions is mostly slow; periodic frustration and impatience are expected. But we are not a dictatorship or a magic kingdom, where things happen with a wave of the hand or the wand. We work hard at building collaboration, and on exercising due diligence, good judgment, and stewardship of our mission. The only way to make change happen faster? You guessed it: an infusion of a very large amount of cash. That would be nice! If anyone can swing it, do let us know.

Minding Our Business

In this issue of Minding Our Business, you'll get a rough rundown of where we stand as we head into the final weeks of our current fiscal year. As always, the extraordinary efforts of **Steve Gorosh, Linda Gould, and Richard Jeffery** have made it possible to make our money situation as transparent as it can be – and far more transparent than it was just six months ago. They deserve our deepest thanks. And the outlook is better than the \$87,000 deficit we thought we might have – but we don't expect to be in full budgetary balance, despite close attention to cost cutting, managing our money wisely and looking to boost revenue wherever we can. We have done a close review of rental and insurance contracts with an eye to updating them and completed other essential budget management tasks. And as those of you who've been homeowners know, there's always something – this month it was more plumbing and air conditioning work, and we still have security fixes to complete. *It's always something.* And we are working with a very lean staffing pattern since our financial situation has us 'down' at least two full time positions.

For the past several months, Executive Committee members have shared a number of responsibilities that would ideally be handled by staff. So to all of you volunteers who've stepped up – THANK YOU. We depend on you to sustain our day to day efforts – and a very special thanks to those of you who don't shrink from anything, including watering (especially **Eric Ortner and Dawna Wheeler**), flag washing (**Tom Stansbury**, who is also our volunteer coordinator), editing on-the-fly while answering phones and manning the video entry system (**Rhonda Rockwell**), or vacuuming (thank you, **Steve Edelstein!**). And so many more of you without whom we couldn't run the place. You are the sparks that coalesce into a flame that can warm us all. We were so pleased to honor you at our first-ever Gratitude Shabbat in May.

You know we've raised dues this year by 5% across all categories of membership. If our numbers don't change, we'll bring in an additional \$9000 from this alone. This is a start – but it's not enough to solve our revenue shortfalls. Our cost-cutting efforts this year have helped us

significantly reduce our expenditures, mainly by laying off staff. This has led to the inevitable understaffing I mentioned earlier – and that itself won't be sustainable over the long haul. We have managed to increase our revenue somewhat over projections at the start of the budget year, thanks to our three major fundraisers.

If we can stay on the path of wise frugality – not guaranteed despite our best efforts – and if we can launch successful new revenue ventures you've been hearing about – we may be able to stay in our building. But we need you all to chip in. We've resisted levying an assessment on our members so far – to continue to resist, every single member must participate in our financial support to the maximum extent of their capacity. These are harsh words, I know. But we are often strapped for cash when an essential new repair lands in our lap or some other unexpected expense comes up. Not only that – if we are to grow our existing rentals ("regulars" and one-time quinceaneras and special events), we need to do something about our kitchen! Maybe not the 'big vision' you've been reading about in these pages, but a smaller, stepwise one: for example,



in Phase 1, we could purchase **one new oven that works all the time**, professionally clean the remaining appliances, and repair the broken floor. These simpler steps would make our space much more marketable for the kinds of events we already have and much more appealing for us to use again ourselves.

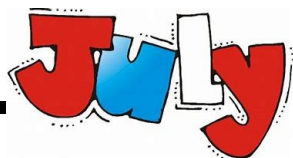

Improving the Environment One Plant at a Time by Larry Fechter

Some time ago faced with an aging and failing irrigation system, a decision was made to "go desert" on the Temple's property. Now, unfortunately, the outcome of shutting down portions of our irrigation system did not yield a lovely, water-wise desert landscape; instead it resulted in some dead ficus trees and a large number of seriously stressed trees rapidly heading for death. Our parking lot really started to look terrible. Not only did we witness the sorry looking change, but so did our neighbors. And their complaints resulted in a code compliance complaint from the City.

In a separate development, a small landscaping committee made up of Temple members began to restore the raised gardens by the Alejo Road entrances to the Temple. With a number of desert friendly plants that were kindly donated and with the sweat of committee members, the gardens began to come back to life. Unfortunately, we discovered, again, that our aging irrigation system was not up to the task of supporting the garden. Happily, through the efforts of Eric Ortner assisted by Dawna Wheeler, Tom Stansbury, and Larry Fechter, we were able to hand water the Alejo Road



gardens as an interim solution.

What to do? Faced with failing landscaping which had been neglected for years and a complaint from the City, a decision was made to hire a landscape designer, restore portions of the irrigation system, remove dead trees, trim out dead portions of the remaining trees, and develop a landscape of which we can be proud.

Work has already begun on the irrigation system, our landscape designer is hard at work, and in early July there should be a major improvement with the elimination of dead trees and trimming of remaining trees. Meanwhile, the landscape committee will resume its efforts to develop attractive landscaping once temperatures are no longer in triple digits. Members of the landscaping committee include Eric Ortner, Arthur and Eileen Eisenberg, Larry Fechter, Tom Stansbury, John Weil, and Dawna Wheeler. And we always welcome new members to the committee. 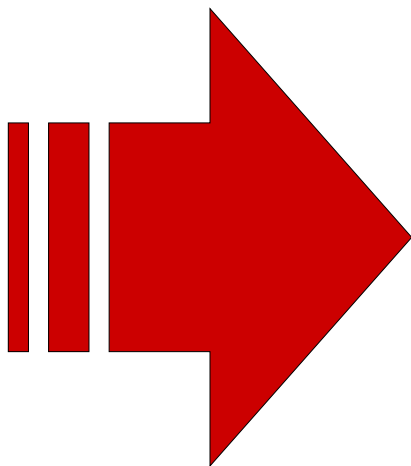
AN EVENING GETTING TO KNOW THE REAL RABBI DAVID LAZAR
