

From the President's Desk Soo Borson, M.D.



My theme this month is financial support of synagogues - general trends and what specifically affects us at Temple Isaiah.

It's the big question facing our Board of Trustees – and those of many other faith communities everywhere. Desert old timers have seen the ups and downs of Palm Springs since the founding of our Temple 70 years ago.

Back then, grateful for the end of the war and on the cusp of post-war prosperity, Jews invested in their synagogues with new vitality, and the birth of the state of Israel catalyzed a remarkable resurgence of Jewish unity and pride. Wealthy members were happy to contribute for naming rights, tap their friends for major gifts, or give just because it was the right thing to do. And there were kids - lots of them!

We could count on the annual Kol Nidre appeal to swell our coffers, but today, the appeal pays for less than 3% of our expenses.

We could count on families to renew their Temple memberships every year for 5 to 10 years - at least until Bar and Bat Mitzvah time. Today, the wealth of our congregation is measured far more in heart than in dollars, and most of the 'old money' is long since gone. Newer (significantly less generous) money seems to have moved down valley or invested elsewhere.

Decisions about belonging to a synagogue can be made one year at a time - depending on how we feel and how fat our wallets are and what other essential and discretionary spending tugs at them.

We have arrived at a point in history when we are all "Jews by choice" - no ghetto or shtetl forces us to live together, share life's troubles and joys, or affiliate with any Jewish organization. Such freedom to choose has radical implications on how synagogues are supported now.

Let's take a closer look at how this plays out here - but first, huge thanks to our stellar finance working group: Linda Gould, Richard Jeffery, and Steve Gorosh, assisted by our amazing administrator Larea Pettersen, for getting on top of our money and showing us where we need to trim and boost! With their help, and the commitment of our Rabbi, Board of Trustees, and staff, we are "managing to our budget" for the first time in years and should see our smallest deficit in over a decade this year. But - it's still a deficit; we are not 'breaking even' and have no margin.

How much does it cost to run our synagogue and community center? Our total expenses for fiscal year 2017-2018 are expected to be about \$685,000. We'll have to spend a bit more than that to pay our bills - but thanks to belt-tightening and efforts to generate new revenue, gone are the days of million dollar budgets and endowmentbusting \$300,000 deficits. We're spending less, it's true! How did we do it? By laying off staff, increasing the involvement of our volunteer board and congregants, and just plain looking for ways to bring in money and trim costs

wherever we could. And by dramatic improvements in accountability.

Where does our money come from? We have four major sources of revenue. • Membership dues. Happily, our membership numbers have been pretty stable or a bit up for the past few years, but cover only about a third of our current expenses and can never be our main source of support. • Contributions – tributes and special donations are the second major source of funds and cover about 20% of our costs; we need a minimum of \$122,500 every vear. • Rental income. This is our third largest source of revenue, accounting for \$104,392 or 15% of expenses this year. This includes the use of our space by Creative Beginnings Montessori school, the Desert Winds Freedom Band, the Palm Springs Bridge Club, private parties (quinceaneras and other one-time events), and a few others. • Fundraising. Revenue from our three major fundraisers (the Jewish Film Festival, Jews Do The Blues and Modernism Week) netted more than \$18,000 over expectations, but will still cover just about 10% of our essential expenses.

You asked – and now you know. What may be less obvious is the extraordinary level of effort and diligence it takes to manage budgets that are this tight. It's no business plan for the future. Wouldn't it be nice if we could talk about something else? Look to a future with at least a little margin – just enough "extra" to try new ideas without counting the nickels and dimes?

We have a couple of potential resources that may generate the margin we need for sustainability, which will involve re-purposing part of our facility. Realistically, we do not need and are not using all of our enormous facility. Dedicating space (with separate entry) to a drug rehabilitation center is in the works and we are almost ready to apply for licensing with the State.

A second potential source of income is bringing our kitchens up to code and making them available to small businesses and private events. Hopefully most of you have seen the video on the kitchen ... More on this under "Minding Our Business" on the next page.

We've heard the phrase "it takes a village." At Temple Isaiah "it takes a congregation" to survive and thrive. You are vital to assuring our future!

CARING KITCHEN FUNDRAISER

Temple Isaiah has launched its first-ever crowdfunding campaign with the purpose of restoring our two outdated commercial kitchens to working condition and obtaining health department commercial certification.

The goal of restoring our kitchens is to provide a needed community service. We want to provide space for small food producers and entrepreneurs, especially those from underresourced sectors of our community, to develop their businesses. Shared commercial kitchen space is at a premium in our valley and we can help address that deficit and benefit our community in the process.

We will help leverage this effort by building partnerships with small-business developers, accredited post-secondary education providers, culinary arts educators, local restaurants and chefs and other businesses and non-profits in the local hospitality industry.

From the Rabbi's Study Rabbi David Lazar



Quite often, members ask why I, as Temple Isaiah's rabbi, am involved in the various, perhaps more technical, aspects of running our non-profit organization? Shouldn't I, as Temple Isaiah's spiritual leader, limit myself to the lofty matters of Torah, Mitzvot and the meaning of life?

As I complete my third year here in Palm Springs, I think it's a good time to

clarify my role as rabbi and spiritual leader of Temple Isaiah for myself, and to share with you those clarifications.

Traditionally, a rabbi has been first and foremost a teacher. Steeped in Jewish learning - Bible, Talmud, Halacha, History and Philosophy - rabbis have accumulated wisdom and knowledge not just for their own sake, but also to share with others, with those who would seek instruction in how and why to live an engaged Jewish life.

And indeed, I spend much of my time reading and studying classical Jewish texts along with modern academic scholarship. Quite often, I do this to prepare for Shabbat sermons or our many classes. In the weekly ExploraTorah class, we make our way through the Five Books of Moses, verse by verse, word by word, in search of the simple meaning of the biblical text while accessing the rich tradition of post-biblical interpretation: Apocryphal and rabbinic literature alongside medieval and modern commentaries. I lead a smaller group of our members who gather - also weekly - for our introduction to Judaism course, 2BaJew, exploring the Jewish year and life cycle, history and philosophy. Twice monthly many of you join Peter Gordon and me at **Psalm Springs**, where Jews and Christians from our area come together in study and (oft times very) personal discussion of the Psalms. Still others join 2-3 times a month as we read and discuss together Rabbi Heschel's The Sabbath.

I also spend time on my own in independent research, studying the Jewish literary classics as well as reading a wide variety of modern Jewish and non-Jewish books in connection with contemporary issues here in the United States and around the world, sociology, political commentary, religion and even science. These topics may have no obvious relevance to my official rabbinic work, but these are crucial for my development as a Jew and as a human being.

For without educating oneself, one cannot educate others.

Aside from sharing with others what they have to offer, rabbis, through group instruction and individual conversations, constantly teach by modeling a way of life devoted to combining the Jewish tradition with contemporary society. And that leads me to my understanding of the term spiritual leader.

Spiritual leadership means getting beyond the books and the words into both prayer and action. It means offering, through personal example, behavior that might serve not just to instruct, but also to inspire others in best ways of integrating Jewish tradition with life today.

And in order to lead, one must constantly search for the right paths (not just one!) upon which to journey. For without moving oneself, one cannot move others.

And so, both as a rabbi and a spiritual leader, I actively contribute to the conversation, to the decision making process that might set us, as a sacred spiritual community, apart from other types of businesses and non-profits. If we are in the business of spirit, and I believe we are, then the rabbi's business is just about everything that goes on in our congregation.

I realize that not all of our members agree with this approach. But as we move forward with both our Caring Kitchen and TIHuR (Temple Isaiah Healing and Recovery) programs, alongside our prayer services and educational programing, I hope that you will consider the merits of what I've presented..

Rabbi Chaya Came to Town!




As part of our "Judaism in the 21st Century Lecture series. Rabbi Chaya Rowen Baker came to Temple Isaiah on April 29th and spoke on the

The Temple Isaiah BOOK CLUB


Join the Temple Isaiah Book Club. Self led, we will read and discuss both fiction and non-fiction books on a variety of Jewish themes.


