WHAT:	A ritual to symbolize and embody renewal, setting positive intentions for the new year			
WHEN:	Between Rosh Hashana afternoon and Yom Kippur, any time			
WHY:	Ascribed to Micah 7:19 –	God will	take us back in love, cover up all our iniquities, cast all our sins into the depths of the sea.'	
WHERE:	Near a body of water, flowing or still or with a distant view of water or with a garden hose or a bowl of water			
PREPARE:	Reflect privately on your life and relationships over the past year and clarify your intentions to improve in the coming year.			
friendly items fallen leaves –	 ss: Natural, environmentally- – spent flower petals, pebbles, to represent what you're regrets, mistakes, patterns serve you. 	or	WRITE to dissolve : Words for what you're casting away, with washable marker on slips of paper, or with chalk on pavement or stone. After the water has dissolved your words, pour it out on the earth to rejoin the water cycle. Compost or bury the wet paper.
