

Nishmat Kol Ḥai: The Breath of Every Life

נשמת כל חי

This is an excerpt from Rabbi Benjamin's talk on Erev Rosh Hashanah. The full talk can be seen here.

t first, we translated this year's theme as, "The Breath of All Life," before changing it to "The Breath of Every Life." Because to say "all life" is not the same as saying every life. This life right here, and this one, and this one — they each matter.

It is in this spirit that the rabbis teach that anyone who takes a life is considered to have "destroyed an entire world," and anyone who saves a life is regarded as if they "sustained an entire world." Not simply an essential part of the world, but each life in and of itself an olam maleh — an entire world.

In order to build a world in which all life can breathe freely, we must look first toward those lives and communities in which the capacity to breathe is already most compromised.

Rabbi Yehoshua ben Levi met Eliyahu (Elijah) while the prophet was standing at the entrance to the cave of Rabbi Shimon bar Yohai...He asked Eliyahu...: "When will the Moshiah (the Mes-

siah) come?" Eliyahu answered, "Go and ask him..." Rabbi Yehoshua was amazed: "You mean I could find him, talk to him—now? Where is he?" Eliyahu said, "You can find him at the gates of Rome." "How will I recognize him at the gates of Rome?" asked Rabbi Yehoshua. Eliyahu told him, "There he sits among the lepers whom you will find unwinding all of their bandages at the same time and then covering their sores with clean bandages. The Moshiah is the only one who unwinds and rewinds his bandages one at a time, thinking, 'I want to be ready at a moment's notice if I am called'."

Could Jewish tradition here be any more explicit? The Moshiah is not simply sitting among the lepers, he is one of them. The figure imagined as heralding in a new era of right-eousness and harmony in the world, is in this current incarna-

tion the quintessential outcast. The one who is marginalized and dehumanized. Let's spell it out: The path to the Messianic era begins with those whose lives, in the eyes of society, matter less.

Our task is to emulate that embodied kinship. As we will hear the prophet Isaiah demand on Yom Kippur morning, what is truly required on that most sacred day is "to share [our] bread with those who starve, to bring the wretched poor into [our] house, to clothe someone [we] see who is naked."

What would this really look like in our lives and community? As we talk about creating a world truly centered around mutual care and obligation, what is really being asked of us? Because it can be pretty uncomfortable down there at the gates of Rome. Unsettling and even frightening, being proximate to those who are cast aside, targeted, denied dignity and humanity. To get out there and get close enough to distinguish how many

bandages at a time each person is removing — that's proximate. Some of you do it. Some of you live it. And you have my utmost admiration and honor. And there are many ways to be in

kinship, each of us to our own capacity and readiness. I know that in this year we are now beginning, I feel called to get closer. Let's accompany one another on that path.

Rabbi Yehoshua went to Rome and did get to ask when the Messiah would come. "Today,' said the leper." Today? Rabbi Yehoshua couldn't believe it. And he was discouraged when it didn't happen. Until Eliyahu explained that the Moshiah was quoting a verse: "Today, if to his Voice you really listen..." That voice urging us to share our bread, to clothe someone who is naked. That voice affirming that each life is an entire world. That collective voice of communities crying out to breathe free. If we really listen and respond to that voice, to each of those voices, then today friends, right now, even amidst loss and peril, we already are building that world.

Discussion on White Supremacy, White Nationalism, and Anti-Semitism

Wednesday, Oct. 7, 7-8:30pm

Havurah's Countering White Nationalism cohort invites you to join us on the High Holiday platform for a conversation about the differences between white supremacy and white nationalism, including the role anti-Semitism plays within the white nationalist movement. The Torah of Our Lives: Havurah Spiritual Writing Group

Wednesdays at 7pm, Oct. 14 - Dec. 2

With intention and focus, writing can be a spiritual practice. The words showing up on the page often surprise the writer themselves. Writing can emerge from the depths of our soul, and how we eventually choose to frame our thoughts and experiences can shape our spiritual development. Torah is our core spiritual writing that includes the commandment to write. The book of Numbers ends with God commanding Moses to write the steps of our journey. Near the end of Deuteronomy God tells Moses to write our story into a song. Starting October 14, with Beresheet, In Beginning, please join Harriet Cooke and Jenni Besen for an eight-week journey into spiritual writing using prompts from Torah that we weave into our lives. Each evening will begin with a summary of the week's Torah portion and pearls from commentary. We will then have two timed free writes from prompts from the portion, followed by optional, but encouraged, sharing. All that is required is a journal. There is an optional opportunity to choose a portion to study, summarize, and choose the writing prompts. Facilitation by Harriet Cooke, who has been trained and led groups with Write Around Portland, then led an eight-year writing group with congregation P'nai Or. 10 people maximum.

Havurah Climate Action Team News

s election day approaches, the Climate Action Team has identified many ways we can make our environmental views known.

We are going directly to the politicians. This summer the congregation approved our participation in the national group, Jewish Earth Alliance. Each month they send us an Action Alert on a particular climate issue. We will use the background they provide and our personal (Jewish) perspective to write our members of Congress. Our letters are emailed to Washington where volunteers hand deliver them. October letters will spring from the environmental example of Sukkot. The Jewish Earth Alliance's interesting FAQ sheet discusses the value of this personal approach. Check out their website jewishearthalliance.org for the most recent action.

Some members are going directly to voters in partisan and nonpartisan ways. The Sierra Club, for example is sponsoring letter-writing campaigns in several swing states. They provide names, addresses, and a bare bones letter which the volunteer expands.

Vote Forward and Swing Left

(partisan) are other sponsors of letterwriting drives. Locally Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon is conducting voter outreach through their Just Vote training and support for climate justice voters.

Face to face contacts are known to be far more effective than conventional TV ads or anonymous mailings. This year, without face to face exposure, some members are texting and phoning voters as well as writing personal hand addressed letters.

The Environmental Voter Project has researched and reasoned that it is easier to change voting behavior than political opinions and that voting is a habit that is sensitive to social pressure. They target the surprisingly large share of committed environmentalists who are registered but do not vote and have them agree to vote this year. The goal is to increase the votes and show politicians, based on the new numbers, that climate is an important issue to their constituents.

Follow ups show that these various personal contacts affect elections by numbers that sound small, maybe just 2 or 3 percentage points, but that is a

meaningful result in modern elections.

In other news, Havurah has become a co-signer to a series of letters addressed to particular sources of Portland's polluted air. These individual industrial polluters are asked by affected neighborhoods to voluntarily mitigate the conditions causing the problem. Portland Clean Air has been assisting neighborhood associations with these direct efforts which have resulted in several agreements.

Upcoming celebration! Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon is holding a virtual celebration of this "season of creation," Sunday afternoon, October 4, 2:30-4pm.

This interfaith celebration will focus on regional creation and sustainability goals, the roots in our spiritual traditions, and actions for our involvement. HCAT member Harriet Cooke will present from our Jewish perspective. Registration is at EMO/OIPL Season of Creation. (That's the Oregon Interfaith Power and Light.)

Being Transparent About Transparency

omeone once told me that the best way to communicate a message is to tell your audience what you are going to tell them, then tell them what you want to tell them, then tell them what you just told them. This short article fits into the first category of that piece of advice. I am here to tell you what we are going to be telling you.

In June 2020, the Steering Committee adopted <u>Guidelines</u> <u>for Increasing Transparency and Inclusivity in Congregational Decisions</u>. This thoughtful and comprehensive guidance envisions a Havurah where our actions are clearly communicated and our opportunities are openly publicized; a Havurah with fewer barriers to access; a Havurah where our opinions are sought and valued; a Havurah where we all feel a part "of."

These are lofty goals to be sure. And perfect adherence to each element of every guideline in every circumstance is unrealistic. But, with the Guidelines as a touchstone, we can aspire to keeping the principles of transparency and inclusivity at the forefront of our communication and decision-making processes. Simply put, we can do better and now we have a tool to use to help guide us. Thanks to the efforts of the Transparency & Inclusivity Committee – working across clusters, committees, and demographics – we now have a well-articulated set of frameworks to turn to in order to test our actions. We have a new lens through which to consider our behavior.

Next month there will be a more comprehensive article discussing the Guidelines and explaining how we hope to weave them into the fabric of our congregation. That will be the article that tells you in more detail about our transparency and inclusivity aspirations and goals. That will be the article that tells you what we want to tell you. In the meantime, I hope this short piece has been a useful preview of the main attraction and gotten you thinking about how these Guidelines might help us to move towards being a more inclusive and transparent community.

Space Jam Committee: To Infinity & Beyond!

o infinity and beyond? Maybe not. But, maybe up to a second story and beyond! This is an option we are exploring now.

To make sure we examine all reasonable options to relieve Havurah's space jam, the committee contacted our original architect, Richard Brown, to get more information about the possibility of adding a second story to our existing building. We met with Richard and his partner, Hope Telford, of Telford+Brown Studio Architecture, in mid-August and they walked us through some rough ideas of possible second floor space configurations. The rough sketches looked promising and the prospect of "building up" felt excit-

ing. We asked them for a feasibility proposal.

In late August, we received a "Proposal for Building Expansion Feasibility Study" from Telford+Brown, which was presented to the Steering Committee at its September 8 meeting. The Steering Committee reviewed the rough sketches of the potential buildups, thoroughly examined the Feasibility Study proposal, and ultimately voted to approve an expenditure of \$9630 to Telford+Brown to prepare the proposed Feasibility Study. Even if we ultimately decide that "building up" is not the best choice for our community, the Steering Committee agreed that we would need the information provided in the Feasibility Study in order to compare the cost of "staying put" versus "moving elsewhere."

The work on the Feasibility Study will commence after High Holidays, and while that effort is moving forward, the Space Jam Committee will continue to push ahead on other fronts. With our broker, we will be investigating and identifying what buildings are on the market in the Portland area that might suit our needs. We will also actively research what religious buildings are currently on the market, or might be in the near future.

In short, our space odyssey continues, and we appreciate your continued engagement as we explore our options.
