Give Us Wisdom and Skillful Hands to Heal

On Rosh Hashanah we chant the words, *hayom harat olam* — "today the world was born." Beyond any of our individual lives, and even our collective human life, Rosh Hashanah carries with it the energy of creation — of the creative, renewing forces within the earth, the waters, and the skies and everything within them.

So this sacred season invites us to turn our attention more deeply toward the web of life of which we are a part. In all the beauty of that life, and with all the heartbreak we feel for its current state. Catastrophic wildfires and flooding, record-high temperatures, devastating storms and other extreme weather are reminders of how serious the climate crisis is. As we move toward Rosh Hashanah, I find myself deeply appreciating the beauty and preciousness of the world, especially these powerful and sacred lands in which we are fortunate enough to live, and also feeling the precariousness of the future of life here and elsewhere. With all this in mind and heart, I share this prayer (adapted), from Rabbi David Seidenberg:

Elohei Haruḥot, God of all spirit, all directions, all winds, You have placed in our hands power—unlike any since the world began—to overturn the orders of creation. Please give us wisdom and skillful hands to heal the Skies and the Earth from our actions; 'May salvation arise for the heavens,' that the blessings of the sun

flow over us for life and not for death, for blessing and not for curse.

God full of compassion, remember Your covenant with all life, the covenant of the waters of Noah. Spread a Sukkah of compassion and peace over us, over all Life's species; Surround all our relations with Shekhinah's radiance; Water them with Your river of delights in all of their habitats.

Blessed be the Life of all the worlds.

As we enter another Season of Returning, we pray for all people and all beings in every place ravaged by disaster. May these prayers inspire and guide action. Because so much human action — policies of greed and callousness — has created the conditions for these disasters to

occur. Andrea Brower, an activist and scholar from Kaua'i, has written a powerful analysis of how the devastating fires in Maui are a result of "empire, capitalism, elite power, and their ravaging of the planet and people." I encountered her writing through Rabbi Arthur Waskow, whose **Shalom Center** is an important Jewish home for climate action, as is **Dayenu**, both very much aligned with the important work Havurah's Climate Action Team does.

With blessings for animals — human and non-human — and plants everywhere, for rivers and oceans and mountains, forests and skies, that we might together know renewed security and well-being. May life everywhere one day thrive in safety, free from harm, and may we all — each in the ways we need — be inscribed for life and vitality in the year to come.

Greetings from Havurah's New Vice President

Shalom! My name is Keren McCord, and I am the new Vice President. I have spent many years thinking about leadership roles at Havurah, but never felt I was ready to take on such a tremendous responsibility. Now that my children are older and my time is becoming more flexible, I feel that I am ready to throw myself into Havurah Leadership head first. I am not going to lie, there is a part of me that feels very overwhelmed. I know this is a tremendous commitment. However, the time feels right, and I feel that I am ready to give back to a community that has offered me so much.

I joined Havurah 22 years ago after my husband and I were fortunate enough to become pregnant with our first child. My husband is not Jewish but said that he would feel comfortable in a spiritual com-

munity. I grew up in a large Reform synagogue in Atlanta where I went to Sunday school, Hebrew School and had my Bat Mitzvah. I don't recall my synagogue feeling like a community. It felt like more of a place that my family went to consume Judaism. I don't recall it feeding my soul.

The place where I fell in love with Judaism was Camp Barney Medinitz, a Jewish summer camp in the North Georgia Mountains. I went to this amazing place from the time I was six years old until I was 22. I learned how to feel Judaism at camp, how to find it in the woods, and on the lake. I learned how to pray in our beautiful outdoor chapel in a way that made sense to me. As campers and staff, we got to be creative about how we expressed our spiritual selves. Without camp I am not sure I would have stayed affiliated. When I moved to Portland one of my closest friends took me to High

Holiday services. Immediately, I felt my Jewish soul waking up. The singing, the creative drashes, the authentic sharing of what it meant to people to be Jewish. I was excited. It almost felt a bit like camp!

Joining Havurah was one of the best decisions I have ever made in my life. By participating in many different ways I have met so many people and have learned so much. Havurah has been there for me and my family in good times and ones that were heartbreaking. I have always felt that I have had the support of this community.

I recognize that our community is growing at a rapid pace. I am grateful to know that people are finding their way to a community that will hopefully meet their needs. With this growth, I would love to find ways to keep us connected and known to each other. Thank you for allowing me to be in service to Havurah.

Interfaith Alliance on Poverty's "First Thursday" Lunchtime Zoom Events Return in September

As I prepare to enter the month of Elul, a time of introspection and personal stock-taking, I am reflecting on what brought me to join Havurah Shalom. Havurah's mission of providing a diverse and participatory Jewish community steeped in spirituality, learning and acts of social responsibility spoke to me, and being a Reconstructionist community reflected both my values and where I am at in my life's journey. I was especially drawn to participating in the activities of the work of the Tikkun Olam cluster with regard to poverty and homelessness, so I joined the Interfaith Alliance on Poverty.

The Alliance formed in 2015 and brings together a network of faith-based communities and civic partners to learn about, understand and address the root causes of poverty in our community. Havurah is one of 14 faith-based communities who are current members of the Alliance.

Poverty & Homelessness Committee

They meet the first Thursday of each month, except for the summer months. Since Covid, the meetings have been held on Zoom starting at noon and lasting for an hour and a half. The next meeting of the Alliance will be September 7 at noon. You will need to register in advance to then be sent a link to the Zoom meeting. You can register for the meetings at the Alliance's website: allianceonpoverty.org.

Past featured speakers have included City of Portland Mayor Ted Wheeler, Kaia Sands from Street Roots, Juan Carlos Ordonez from the Oregon Center for Public Policy, and Chris Bouneff from the Oregon National Association of Mental Illness. At the end of each Alliance Program Meeting, speakers are asked for action items that can be used by the

individuals in attendance and taken back to each member's congregation. An example of a project that the Alliance has worked on involved the NE Cully neighborhood. The Alliance coordinated with the neighborhood and the Living Cully organization to support families at the Oak Leaf Mobile Home Park as they transitioned over the course of a year to a revitalized park.

If you want to get even more involved in working on poverty issues, the Alliance has three action teams: Transition to Stability, Poverty Awareness, and Communication and Advocacy. More detailed information about each team can be found on the Interfaith Alliance on Poverty website, along with access to the newsletters that provide information about past programs and other resources. If you do get involved, I encourage you to let one of the co-chairs of the Havurah Poverty and Homeless committee know about your activities. The co-chairs are Gloria Halper and Steve Rudman.

Urban Trees Vital to Climate-Resilience

On Monday, August 21 2023, Havurah's Climate Action Team (HCAT) signed onto a letter to Governor Tina Kotek opposing a recent proposal from the Housing Production Advisory Council (HPAC) to restrict local governments from maintaining their urban forest canopy while increasing housing density. We joined 20 organizations, including Portland Audubon and Willamette Riverkeeper, to remind the governor that meeting housing needs and goals must be done while maintaining the Portland tree code and expanding the tree canopy, not sacrificing them.

We are in a climate crisis, with our most vulnerable residents already dying from scorching heat. Urban tree canopy is a key factor in keeping urban neighborhoods cooler, but its inequitable distribution within cities, including Portland, is magnifying climate impacts on historically marginalized communities.

The HPAC recommendation stands in stark contrast to

Havurah Climate Action Team (HCAT)

work taking place throughout the state and nation to *increase* tree cover as a key tool for growing climateresilient cities. Housing and green infrastructure are not mutually exclusive. Both are necessary for healthier residents and to be better climate-prepared. You can read a great *Oregonian* column from Steve Duin on the HPAC here.

HCAT meets monthly and communicates by email to support each other through the climate crisis and to advocate for necessary legislation. As you reflect on your part in global solutions, consider joining us for learning, support, and action! Together we make a difference and develop meaningful relationships.

Witnessing the Unfolding Climate Crisis: Book Club to See the Boreal Forest and the Trees

After the ocean, the boreal forest is the largest biome—living system—on earth. Encircling the globe in a nearly continuous green ring, this "lung" is essential to the planet's health.

Author Ben Rawlence takes the reader on a journey around the world, stopping at places in the boreal forests. From Ireland to Wales, to Norway to Siberia, to Alaska, Canada and Greenland, Rawlence journeys with the peoples of the North and interviews scientists and indigenous people whose families have lived in these regions for tens of thousands of years. All of it is suddenly changing with our warming climate and massive wildfires.

Rawlence writes not only the stories of our modern times, but also of the historical reasons for the disappearance of forests in Ireland and Scotland. His writing is lyrical, with rigorous reporting, as he grapples with the rapidly changing conditions and what this might mean for the future of life on Earth. His book is an amazing study in the ecology of these forests. Reading it I felt everything from awe, to terror, to hope.

Effective 6-15-2023

Community activities and events:

- Recent COVID Symptoms Individuals experiencing the recent onset of COVID symptoms (fever, chills, new loss of taste or smell, congestion, cough, shortness of breath) should not participate in Havurah activities.
- Recent positive COVID test Continue to follow CDC isolation requirements with respect to isolation and masking.
- Masking is welcome and optional Except as stated below, masks are optional at Havurah activities.
 - ♦ Tested positive for COVID recently? Wear a high-quality mask and follow CDC guidelines on Removing Your Mask before removing it while at Havurah.
 - ♦ Are you unvaccinated? Masking is encouraged.
 - Masks may be requested. Other masking protocols may be requested at the discretion of those involved in planning or participating in an activity.

As part of that effort, consider feeding our neighbors with special diets by donating an alternative butter—jars without added sugar or salt.

In addition, other items in high demand that Lift UP needs include: rice, whole-grain pasta, and easy-to-prepare breakfast items like instant oatmeal cups and granola bars.

Lift UP's vision is a Portland where everyone has access to healthy food and opportunities to connect with others. Both Rose Haven and Lift UP are organizations that have been serving those in need in Portland for many years.

Havurah is no longer ordering lulavs and Etrogs, but you can purchase them directly from the Kollel, which has an online shop here, or Everything Jewish.



Drop-Off/Pick-Up Spaces


We know parking can be challenging, so to make things easier, we have arranged for spaces at both the Tiffany Center and Havurah where you can drop off and pick-up passengers. Please see the accompanying maps and instructions for details.



Tiffany Center Drop-Off/Pick-Up

The drop-off area is on SW 14th, just before the intersection with SW Morrison. SW 14th is a one-way street, so plan your route accordingly.


