Passover Reflections for 2023/5783

Rabbi Heschel writes, "To do a mitzvah is to outdo oneself, to go beyond one's own needs and to illumine the world. But whence should come the fire to illumine the world? Time and again we discover how dim is the light within. There is not enough strength within our power to transcend ourselves... But there is an *ecstasy of deeds*, luminous moments in which we are raised by overpowering deeds above our own (weary) will; moments filled with outgoing joy and intense delight!"

Last year, as a community, we missed the mark. We fell far short of the needs of our community to have a place at a seder table. We were just beyond the worst of Covid, and that was enough for too many of us to not open our doors to the stranger, or even our Zoom rooms.
