High Holidays 5778

I want you to think for a moment about the name of the first holiday of the Jewish Year - Rosh Hashanah. The words, Rosh Hashanah, come from the Hebrew words, Rosh and Hashinui - the beginning of change. In addition to food and family gatherings, this is a time when we begin to look at the ways our lives have changed.

I recently read a quote from the Japanese poet Mizuta Masahide: "My barn having burned down, I found I could see the moon." This is a reminder that change has the capacity to open our souls and hearts. Change can open us to recognizing new blessings, even if they come in unexpected ways. Change can open us to recognizing new sides of ourselves, even if we think we already know who we are. Change is our chance to experience the new, to identify additional options and generate different opportunities.

The "AL CHEIT" prayer on Yom Kippur ("For the sin WE have committed before you"), is said in the plural, reflecting our communal responsibility for our imperfect world. I invite you to write your own personal "Al Cheit" passages. I encourage you to write verses that resonate personally and deeply for you. Some examples of what others have acknowledged are:

- For the sin we have committed before you by humiliating someone (A waitress... my child... in public
- For the sin we have committed before you by throwing tantrums when we don't get our way.
- For the sin we have committed before you buy squandering our time and money.
- For the sin we have committed before you by getting out of a commitment by telling a lie.

I want to share this exercise with you before the holy days in order to give you time to reflect on the ways you have conducted your life in the past

year. Also, at each holiday service leading up to Yom Kippur there will be an "Al

Cheit Box" in which you can place your personal passages. It is my intention when we get to the "AL Cheit" prayer in the service to share our personal "AL Cheits" instead of those printed in our prayer book. Of course, this will remain anonymous.

In order to embrace the new, we must release the old. A trapeze artist cannot swing from one bar to the other without letting go. It is important that as we prepare for the new year, we review the past year to release it and to learn from it.

The following questions are intended to stimulate reflection. I hope you take some time to ponder where you are and where you have been. Talk with people you care about. Attempt to look at yourself and your experience with as much objectivity as you can.

Here are some suggestions to get you started in looking back and taking a personal account.

- What did I learn? (skills, knowledge, awareness, etc.)
- What did I accomplish?
- What would I have done differently? Why?
- What did I complete? What still feels incomplete to me?
- What were the top three significant events of the past year?
- What were the fun things I did?
- What were my biggest challenges/ roadblocks/ difficulties?
- How am I different this year than last?

When they care about something they fully commit. When they were younger they started selling hair bands with cute charms on them and donated all the proceeds to World Wildlife Fund. They continue to care about animals and people and we are very proud of their good hearts and dedication.

Judaism is important to us and we try to celebrate our culture and religion in a fun, loving and meaningful way. We have been fortunate to find that Rabbi Cove is supportive of these efforts. At Leah's Bat Mitzvah, Rabbi Cove called us a family of DIYers and called attention to how we like a personal touch. He did a wonderful job with Leah's service and helped people from diverse backgrounds find meaning in the service. We are excited that he will also be officiating at Maya's Bat Mitzvah in October. Rabbi Cove is a caring educator who is able to create an atmosphere of acceptance and openness and to integrate personal elements so that the ceremony is special and spiritually resonates with all. We are grateful to have him in our lives and to have Beiteinu.
