



Along with the traditional and familiar rituals of the Passover Seder such as eating matzah and maror and drinking four cups of wine, the essence of the Seder experience is the telling of the story of the Exodus from Egypt. While we all know the story's details, I thought I would share two different perspectives on why that story and the Seder are so important.

The Talmud tells us that two Babylonian rabbis, Shmuel and Rav, disagreed about the purpose of the Seder. Shmuel was of the opinion that the enduring lesson of the Exodus which we are reminded of at the Seder was historical; the celebration of our liberation from slavery to a free people, "meavdut l'cherut." On the other hand, Rav taught that the primary lesson of the Seder is theological; our turning away from idolatry to become followers of the one true God who demonstrated His power and His love for us by freeing us from slavery, "meavdut l'cherut," giving us the Torah, and then leading us to the Promised Land.

Which opinion do you think is reflected in the Haggadah?

The answer is both. The truth is that whether we view Passover and the Exodus story as one of historical consequence or as one of theological consequence, both purposes serve to remind us of our journey "meavdut l'cherut," from slavery to freedom. That is also why we are told "bechol dor vador," in every generation, we must see ourselves as if we were personally enslaved and liberated from Egypt. And today, in 2024, we know that these words are not mere reminders of the ancient past but our current condition.

Today, we celebrate Passover with the knowledge that over 100 of our fellow Jews will not be joining us at our Seders. This year, we will celebrate Passover knowing that "meavdut l'cherut," has not come to them and indeed to many of us who experience the bondage of anguish for the hostages. This year, we understand, more than at any other time in our lifetimes, the importance of ensuring that these meaningful words at Passover are not just ancient relics. This year, we must ensure that those words have both a historical and theological meaning as we continue to fight and pray for the release of all our captives, and that true freedom, "meavdut l'cherut," comes to us without fail.

May you have a Chag Kasher V'Sameach, a Happy and Kosher Passover.


