## FROM THE PRESIDENT

At the end of last year, we had the pleasure to add Lisa Richman, a distinguished and experienced Jewish educator to the team as our full time Religious School Director. I am thrilled by the rave reviews she has garnered in her first year with us. And last, but surely not least, we are so fortunate to have Ken Krivitzky, as our Executive Director.

Ken is the "glue" that holds everything together at our synagogue. There is nothing that is unimportant to Ken, nor is there

anything beneath his "pay grade." In addition to accomplishing the myriad tasks that fall within his professional portfolio, Ken does whatever is needed for TBH-BE to run efficiently, safely and well. Whether sweeping off the snow from the front steps at the shul on the day after a storm, putting chicken fingers in the oven for our kids to enjoy at a "First Friday," sharing his cellphone number to help congregants in need during a power outage or running lights for our synagogue's show, Ken is there for us. Every day. However, I will absolutely never, ever forget the Shabbat of October 27, 2018. I was sitting on the Bimah and services were almost finished. ## **The Gifts We Keep on Giving: A Report on Ma'ot Chitim / Charitable Donations Collected Before Pesach 2019 / 5779**

It has been part of my yearly routine to report on the money I have collected and distributed as "Ma'ot Chitim". "Ma'ot Chitim", literally wheat money, is traditionally collected prior to Pesach and distributed to those in need of food for the Holiday and beyond. I believe that this report is an important way to assure you that your contributions have been carefully and responsibly distributed, but there is another reason for this report.

The organizations listed below do amazing work, each in their

own way, about which we should know. In our own, personal distributions, as we consider our own priorities, what are the best organizations which deserve our financial support? What are the pressing issues of our day and which organizations are most responsible and efficient in providing help?

The list below, therefore, is intended to inform and inspire. These are the organizations which I feel meet the requirements of "Ma'ot Chitim" this year. These are organizations that provide both material and spiritual support to those in need. This list is, of course, limited. There are hundreds of worthy organizations which also do amazing, even life-saving work which are not included in this list. Still, I

encourage you to check out these organizations to find out what they do, who they serve and, if you are interested, how you can help.

This year, we distribute \$2000 in *Ma'ot Chitim* funds. This enables us to support 10 agencies with contributions of \$200 for each. Below is a list of the organizations we are supporting this year.

I thank all those who have contributed to our Ma'ot Chitim Fund this year.



### **Funds Supported through Donations to Ma'ot Chitim — Pesach 2019 / 5779**

- 1. The Emergency Fund of The Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia**, working in conjunction with the Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), the Emergency Fund of JFGP helps to feed and care for victims of natural disasters and crises which arise throughout the world.
- 2. Jewish Family and Children's Services.** The Holiday Fund of JFCS provides direct aid for holiday celebrations to those clients in need who reside in the Greater Philadelphia Area.
- 3. MAZON** provides money for food for hungry Jews and non-Jews. MAZON does not give directly to those in need. Rather they raise money and provide support to organizations which are on the front lines in the fight against hunger.
- 4. American Jewish World Services** is an organization which distributes food throughout the world, mostly in Africa, to those who are seriously and dangerously nutritionally challenged.
- 5. JWB (Jewish Welfare Board)** is the primary organization which serves Jews who serve. In each arm of the armed forces, Jewish soldiers receive food and time to observe the holidays, as much as is possible. The JWB allows

# FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

On the synagogue website, there is a simple statement that captures the overall mission of the Sylvia F. Lodish Religious School:

Our Religious School aims to develop a community of children and families who have the skills, knowledge and inspiration to be active members of the Jewish community. Our outstanding faculty consists of experienced teachers who have the education and passion to help Judaism come alive for their students, making our ancient tradition relevant for the lives of our 21st century American Jewish children.

As our academic year winds down, I am taking this time to reflect on the past year and see what was accomplished as we constantly strive to attain our goals.

Have our children gained useful skills?

Throughout the year, our students have led prayers, participated in *Havdalah*, learned Shabbat songs and prayers, donated *tzedakah* and fulfilled the mitzvah of returning lost articles. Our children have participated in fulfilling holiday-related mitzvot such as hearing the sound of the shofar, shaking the lulav and making *matza*.

Some have learned to read from the Torah. Others have practiced putting on *tefillin*, cooked Israeli foods and so much more.

Have our children acquired important knowledge?

The best example of a summative assessment this year was the participation and success of our students in the exciting 'Escape from Egypt' experience. Children were in teams that were comprised of students from varying age groups. As teams, or families, they had to solve a series of puzzles in order to escape. Without the acquired knowledge, they would not have escaped! The puzzles ranged from having to know the steps of the seder to the actual content of the Four Questions. They needed to know the Pesach symbols as well as the words they correspond to in the Haggadah, which they needed to be able to navigate. I can assure you there is no team still working on figuring out the puzzles!

Are there examples of how our children are inspired to be active members of the Jewish community?

Our children are already active and valued members of



the Jewish community. Many of our children attend Shabbat services regularly, in addition to their attendance during Shabbat School. They participate enthusiastically in mitzvah projects they have chosen as preparation for the Bar or Bat Mitzvah service.

Have we accomplished our goals? We always strive to do more and to learn more. As it is said in Chapter 2 in "Pirkei Avot, Ethics of the Fathers":

לא עליך המלאכה לגמור ולא אתה בן-חורין להיבטל מימנה

It is not your responsibility to finish the work, but neither are you free to desist from it.

As we prepare to close out the current school year, dedicated, outstanding faculty members are already planning an exciting coming year, building on the foundation that has been established and looking to enhance our program even further!

Jewish Chaplains to visit soldiers everywhere that US soldiers are stationed and bring them holiday essentials.

6. **Penn State Hillel.** Thousands of Jewish students attend PSU. Over the years I have worked with PSU Hillel, creating the foundations for a new Hillel building and an expansion of Hillel services for the Jewish Students. That building project is now underway. This year, as in the past, hundreds of students stayed on campus and celebrated Pesach together.
7. **Orr Shalom.** This Israeli organization is charged with the responsibility of caring for children at greatest risk and danger in Israeli society. The children cared for by Orr Shalom have been removed from their homes by the courts. These are children who have endured privation, exploitation and abuse of every sort. Under the guidance, and supervision of this organization, these children are cared for in group homes or

in foster care, settings which, for many of these children, are the first places they have lived where they are not at risk.

8. **Free the Slaves.** Particularly on Pesach, the reality of modern-day slavery must be exposed and stopped. Young women and children, seeking a better life, are often snared and forced to work in terrible situations. This organization tries to locate and prevent this sort of human trafficking which has continued without stop for hundreds, if not thousands, of years. Although the setting may be different from those slaves we recall during our Pesach seders, the psychological and emotional effect of this degradation and torturous existence, not to mention the physical toll this takes on those who are enslaved, remains the same.
9. **American Friends of Leket Israel.** Leket is the biblical concept of leaving fruits and vegetables on the ground, if they fall while being harvested.

Leket, in ancient times, was one way that the poor were cared for and fed. In Israel, hunger is still a problem in many sectors of society. This organization collects dropped vegetation, along with other food donated and distributes it.

10. **Aderaba.** Today, the efforts of the Masorti Movement, the Israeli affiliate of the Conservative Movement, extend into new and previously underserved areas of Israeli life. This organization provides bar/bat mitzvah training for children with special needs. Specially trained teachers work with these children individually to provide them with the opportunity to lead services, read from the Torah or participate in other ways that they are able, in a bar/bat mitzvah service. In our congregation, we know the power and beauty of those services. That experience for these children and their families is now made available to them through Aderaba (an Aramaic word meaning "the other way").
