In 1977, Kalman Samuels' second son, Yossi Samuels, at the time 11 months old, was injured and was rendered blind, deaf and acutely hyperactive. After 7 years with no communication, Yossi's special education teacher achieved a breakthrough by relaying sign language into the palm of his hand, teaching Yossi his first word, 'Shulchan' meaning table.

Founding and expansion of Shalva

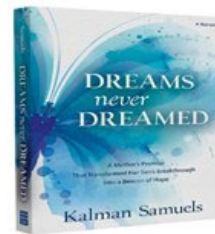
Due to their experiences raising Yossi, Malki and Kalman established an afternoon playgroup for children with disabilities. Over time, the program expanded to meet the needs of a broader spectrum of disabilities, from birth through adulthood.

Today Shalva provides therapy, education, and recreation to hundreds of beneficiaries as well as family support, respite and advocacy initiatives. In recognition of Shalva's accomplishments and an ongoing need to expand the availability of disability services, the Jerusalem Municipality provided Samuels a seven acre plot adjacent to the planned Route 16 highway and the Shaarei Tzedek Medical Center in the Beit HaKerem neighborhood of Jerusalem. The new Shalva National Center enables Shalva to provide a broader range of services to an expanded population of beneficiaries.

Kalman's memoir, *Dreams Never Dreamed*, was released in Hebrew in September 2019 and in English in May 2020.

All proceeds from the sale of the book are directed to Shalva.

Purim and the Pandemic: When the Masks Come Off

There is a moment, in any good mystery, when questions are answered, when confusion evaporates and when we can finally see the solution which, to this point, has evaded us. In the Story of Esther, which we read each year on Purim, that moment of clarity comes when the evil Haman's machinations are uncovered and the intent of his nefarious decree to eradicate the Jewish community of Persia is revealed.

While at a small gathering of three, Haman, King Achashverosh and Queen Esther, Esther reveals the evil decree to the King. The King is incredulous and asks: "Who would devise such a scheme?" And it is here that the proverbial masks come off and the mystery is solved. It is Haman, the architect of evil, who initiated the scheme to kill the Jews of Persia. This is the moment of revelation, the moment when the

masks come off.

It is strangely coincidental that, in our day, the removal of our masks will become a sign that the villain of our story, the coronavirus, has been defeated. After nearly a year of isolation, removing our masks will be recalled as a symbol of a return to our lives of engagement with the larger world and of a renewal of relationships which, for this year, have been virtual. Although some will, undoubtedly, continue to wear a mask as an extra layer of personal protection, the removal of our masks will become the sign to many that we have endured the virus, that we have survived its lethal effects, and that our lives can return to normal. I believe, however, that the jump from COVID to that which was normal before, will not be as easy as some might think.

During the pandemic, our lives were marked by emotions of insecurity and uncertainty, emotions which will not necessarily depart, even after all of the vaccines have been administered. Our inability to prevail over this deadly virus for this past year, created in us feelings of vulnerability and even impotence,

more intense than we thought we would ever feel. Though we can call

ourselves survivors, we live with a greater degree of anxiety than before. We live with the too painful memory of friends and relatives who became sick. We live with memories of uncertainty, not knowing if our loved ones would live or die.

Our lives today are lived in the context of a country that has lost some 400,000 of its people, parents and grandparents, spouses and siblings, friends and relatives who were unable to escape the iron grip of the COVID virus. Today, we inhabit a world, similar to the world we remember from a year ago, but today's world carries the burden of trauma and pain which were not present a year ago.

Our celebration of Purim provides a welcome infusion of joy at a time when we need it the most, but that joy can also serve as a mask behind which we can hide. We hide ourselves beneath the façades of our costumes, pretending to be that which we are not. Purim allows us to use the holiday to hide from the pain



and anxiety with which we continue to live. And so, I remind us all that we must celebrate Purim today, focusing less on hiding and more on removing our masks.

As we celebrate the joy of Purim, let us not delude ourselves into thinking that a mask can hide, indefinitely, the toll taken by post-COVID pressure, the sadness, and the anxiety which many carry, even as the virus is defeated. A mask can be fun to wear. It can make us look silly or scary, but our masks can also enable us to adopt the persona of the mask we wear. The point of Purim is that, ultimately, our masks must come off.

As we begin to see the end of the pandemic, we take note of the masks we have worn during the past year

which reflect our strength, our endurance, and our perseverance. The time has come to remove those masks as well. If you are feeling overwhelmed, inexplicably tired, sad, or depressed, if you feel a burden which belies the mask you may wear, I say to you the following:

1. Your feelings are real. Many millions around the world are experiencing similar feelings. You are not alone.
2. Although we all wear masks at times, this is the time to remove the mask and confront the painful feelings which persist following the pandemic. If these feelings are becoming overwhelming, reach out for help. Call your doctor, your rabbi, your boss, or your principal.

They can help you to find the right person to provide the support you may need.

3. Ultimately, we will be able to recite a litany of lessons learned from the pandemic and of our accomplishments during COVID 19. Getting here has been very difficult and required hard work. Returning to our pre-COVID emotional lives will take hard work too.

Insecurity or uncertainty leave their marks on us. Those marks cannot be washed away or covered up indefinitely. Sooner or later, they must come out. And when they do, if you have someone in place to help, to assist, and to support you, you will find a way, as we all must, to put this year behind us and return with joy and optimism to a new beginning.

FINDING OUR WAZE

Casel (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning), one of the foremost authorities on Social Emotional Learning, defines SEL as “an integral part of education and human development. SEL is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.”

As important as SEL has been in education, never has it been more important than today. To pivot from life as we knew it to life as we are coming to know it has meant a new orientation and a “new normal” which is still in the process of being defined. And to create that new definition, our GPS / WAZE directions are garnered from almost everyone: educators, parents, medical professionals, CDC, CHOP, task forces, relatives, friends, more relatives and more friends. They all provide their information, guidance and opinions, seemingly every minute of every day!

Our Religious School teachers are long-standing professional educators who are constantly learning and, as best they can, adding this new information about SEL to their already full toolboxes. Our madrichim (teen-aides) have been excellent additions to our classes, many having had training over the summer in Gratz’s TAP program.

As an institution for Jewish learning, we use the term: SESL, Social Emotional Spiritual Learning. We work to use “Jewish texts and traditions [that] can foster the growth of positive life outcomes and, in turn, be enriched by these outcomes:

- Developing our understanding of ourselves and our emotions
- Forging meaningful connections with others
- Caring about, and contributing to our local and global communities
- Achieving a sense of meaning, purpose, and transcendence (shalomsesl.org)

What does this look like in our Religious School classrooms? We begin our classes with check ins, checking our temperatures (literally and figuratively!) [to see how we and our classmates are feeling. Teachers monitor body language, engagement and mood. Adhering to physical distancing regulations, teachers

creatively devise ways for students to interact online and in person.]



Our online learners have formed a community of their own and zoom or FaceTime into their classes as often as possible, including special events such as our shofar making workshop in the fall. Students and teachers demonstrate concern for the community at all times by following our new rules and procedures and by encouraging others to adhere to our “new normal” as well:

1. Maintain 6’ between you and the people around you.
2. Use your “indoor” voice.
3. And to avoid “collisions”, we walk on the right and avoid cutting through other lines going in the opposite direction.

At TBH-BE, we go nowhere without our WAZE. Our WAZE provides us with our directions toward a full, evolving curriculum, with the trips and side trips along the way, with the confidence that we shall safely reach our destination, joyfully, purposefully and enriched by the journey.

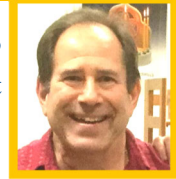
