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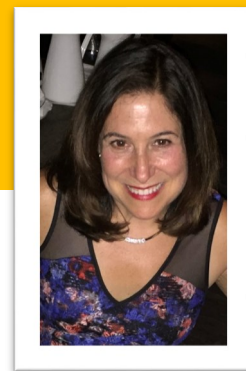

This article, first and foremost, begins with endless gratitude for our clergy, our staff, our members, and everyone who played a part in making our High Holidays a meaningful and successful experience. We are grateful for those that could join us in person and online. It was wonderful having our congregants return to the sanctuary again. An extra todah rabah (thank you) to Katie Grinnell, Sharon Stumacher Gold, Pamela Feld Randel, Ellen Moscow, and David Brawer who helped give our lobby an extra lift for the new year.

On Kol Nidre, I mentioned the mitzvah (commandment) Kol Yisrael Arevim Zeh Ba Zeh, (all of Israel is responsible for one another). I noted how this mitzvah guides my practice of making everyone feel welcome and valued. As I'm writing this article, we're in the intermediate days of Sukkot, and I'd like to share a few examples of how our members follow this mitzvah at TBH-BE and within our community at large.

Sukkot is also referred to as Zeman Simchatenu (time of our joy). Pulling into the synagogue parking lot filled me with pride and joy when I saw our wonderful sukkah village. It was built and decorated by members of our Men's Club, our Cub Pack 1958, and students from our schools. Todah Rabah.

Our volunteers worked tirelessly constructing five different sukkot which enabled our families to fulfill some of the mitzvot of the holiday

and to enjoy it. Our new synagogue Cub Pack 1958 brought in 58 people to learn about scouts and Sukkot as well as construct decorative chandeliers. Even after a long day building sukkot at the synagogue, one of our Men's Club members received an SOS (save our sukkah) call from a new synagogue family and went to help that family construct their sukkah. Todah Rabah. The Sisterhood made edible sukkah kits for every child in the Early Childhood Center and Religious School. Each kit was assembled with care and included instructions. These projects were sent home with the students to create and enjoy. Todah Rabah.

The Religious School welcomed the return of the popular sukkah build event. Eleven different Religious School families hosted classes along with their teacher. They learned together, built together, decorated together, waved the lulav and etrog together, and had fun together! Todah Rabah.

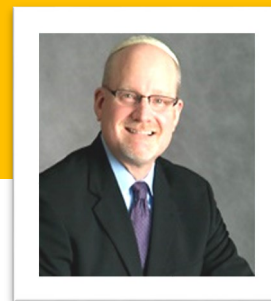

Thank You, Edward Rothschild, 100+ Years Later

Several weeks ago, I received a phone call from Judith Stolnitz, a woman whose name I did not recognize. Judith, originally from Philadelphia, has lived for some time in Valencia, California, a good reason that we had never met and that she was never a member of our synagogue. She had grown up, however, as a member of Temple Beth El, the synagogue which merged with Temple Beth Hillel, more than five decades ago, creating Temple Beth Hillel – Beth El. Judith's grandfather, H.H. Cohen, had been a Trustee at Beth El and, as a lawyer, had provided, at times, his legal counsel to the synagogue. Mr. Cohen, now 94, memory still sharp, had retained a number of papers from his years of activity, as well as documents from before his time. Cleaning out some of Mr. Cohen's files, Judith came across this stack of papers which she thought might be of interest. She called me to ask if I might like her to send those papers to me. I, enthusiastically, said yes. I received those letters and documents about two weeks later.

Many of the letters provide insight into the working of Temple Beth El. Among the letters is one appointing Mr. Cohen as Chairman of the Board, dated March 20, 1960. There is a letter of condolence written to the widow of

Myer Solis Cohen, z"l. Mr. Solis Cohen was one of the original Trustees of Beth El and a member of one of the most prominent Jewish families in Philadelphia.

Another interesting piece of correspondence came in the form of a report of the Annual Meeting of the Trustees, which had been held on April 6, 1951. At that meeting, the congregation's rabbi, Rabbi Leon Lang, informed the Trustees that, during the past year, the congregation had tried using a new prayer book for their services. The meeting minutes reported that the congregation had been less than enthusiastic about the new prayer book. The Board of Directors responded to the new prayer book by assuring the Trustees and the congregation that the new book would not be used and that no changes in the prayer book or services would be approved.

Two by far, the most interesting of the documents was one that spells out the agreement, made on May 28, 1914, between Temple Beth El and Edward Rothschild. As per the agreement, Mr. Rothschild agreed to fund the building of a new synagogue at the corner of 58th Street and Walnut. The funding would be in the amount of \$46,000 (a generous amount for 1914, I presume). Although the congregation would retain its corporate name of Temple Beth El, the building would be known as the Rothschild Memorial Synagogue,

built in memory of Edward's parents, Lippman and Henrietta Rothschild, z"l. I have not been able to find a connection between the famous scion of the Rothschild Family, Baron Edmond de Rothschild, and Edward, although there may well be one.

Of particular interest in that agreement are some of the conditions upon which the money was given. Among those is the following:

The Congregation in its service and in the conduct of the school and in its teachings...shall be devoted to historical Judaism as contained in the laws of Moses and expounded by the Prophets and Sages of Israel in Biblical and Talmudic writings...The said congregation shall, at all times, conduct its worship and services according to the ritual now in use and shall not at any time do or authorize the doing of any act in violation of the Seventh Day Sabbath.

As I read through these correspondences, I wondered what Mr. Rothschild might have thought about Temple Beth Hillel – Beth El today. TBH-BE, you see, received the Rothschild Endowment when Beth El joined Beth Hillel.

I believe he would be pleased by much of what characterizes our synagogue today. His adamance

regarding the preservation of “historical Judaism,” his insistence regarding traditional modes of prayer, and his desire for adherence to the laws of Shabbat have all been upheld. But what Mr. Rothschild could not know was the way that the world, the society, and the Jewish Community would change during the ensuing 100+ years which have transpired between the time of the agreement with Beth El and today. The language of the agreement is strong in its legislation of Jewish Tradition. But finding the balance between the demands of Jewish Tradition and our ability to address the demands we face today

cannot be legislated. The world of technology and modern scientific discovery has changed the way we see the world, to the point that the statement, “at all times” becomes a formidable challenge. What would Mr. Rothschild say about Zoom? Again, it is hard to know. What is certain is that his challenge remains one of ongoing discussion and debate.

One hundred plus years later, a search for new rabbinic leadership is underway. As of this moment, the selection process continues. It is the perennial and ongoing nature of the questions we ask which gives

vibrance and vitality to Jewish Life in every generation. I thank Judith Stolnitz for thinking to contact me and for sending the documents which will now reside with the other such documents of our congregation. And I thank her, as well, for reminding me and us, at a crucial moment in our synagogue’s history, that we should be confident, just as was Mr. Rothschild. The decisions we make today for the benefit of our community will be the right ones to move us forward and make us stronger for the next generation.

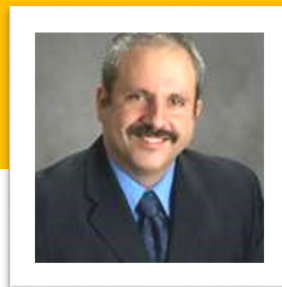

Music to Ears

One of the truly great things about this past summer was the return to somewhat normal style shabbat morning services. Along with the 40-50 people we had weekly and the lower Covid-19 infections, there was the opportunity for expanded davening. It gave us an opportunity to do more singing, both for you and me. A perfect example of this is the Modim Anachnu Lach by Max Wohlberg, (track 44 on Congregational Tunes For Shabbat, found here <https://www.tbhbe.org/fromcantorrosner>). This is, what I would like to call, a congregational melody, with cantorial recitative: The theme, or refrain, returns several times between cantorial solos. It was so refreshing, and yes, uplifting to hear several people saying, "it is so good to hear our melodies again."

I'll let you in on a secret. Knowing that we had the time to do this extended singing chance, I went back to an old playbook. Before each shabbat, I would write out and collect my individual sheets of music planned for each service, each prayer, and the specific melody I would use. A cursory look at my website's collection of CD tracks will often reveal several melodies for each prayer. Cycling these melodies and occasionally adding a new one to the mix, insures variety in our services. When I was a student at the Jewish Theological Seminary, this was a very sound piece of advice given to me and my classmates by the late Max Wohlberg (z'l). I have always kept it in mind during my service


planning.

Now that you've had a look at my webpage, stick around, bookmark it and return often! Peruse the musical offerings; there are many! Other than the congregation melodies there (it is kind of a discography!), you will find Bar/Bat Mitzvah sound files (you can check up on what our students are learning in advance of their semachot), a potpourri, including selections recorded by our choir, and some personal performances I've sung with other regional choirs. There is something for everyone, so please enjoy!

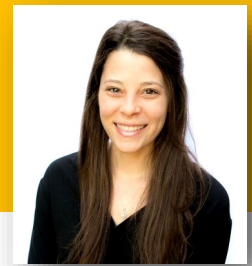

I know there are only a few days left in the month though there is a shared joke amongst many Jewish professionals that Cheshvan is their favorite month precisely because there aren't any Jewish holidays. They are right. After the swarm of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah (my heart is even beating a little faster as I write those out thinking about next year), it's very nice to have a breather. Though what some might forget is that there is a holiday in Cheshvan. Actually every week of Cheshvan. We sing a song about a dinosaur for it.... Put soap and candy in a big pot and stir it all up for it.... Bim Bom until our hands get tired... anyone? Almost all of our TBH-BE children would get that trivia question correct. Shabbat it is!

As a Jewish educator I acknowledge emphasizing the importance of Shabbat in your household as a holiday, a special, and important time for us as a Jewish people is central. There was a time when a selection of Rabbis transitions from Saturday to Sunday to the day of rest, a liberation from being an easy scapegoat in an anti-Semitic world. Even this year I learned of a community that celebrated Rosh Hashanah on Labor Day this year. For many Jewish professionals something like that would be incredibly useful for a personal experience as we are all mostly working on Jewish holidays. Though I truly believe there is something beautiful about timeliness. My grandmother recently said she envies the T.V. show *Blue Bloods* because they have Sunday family dinner with each other every single Sunday afternoon. I told her we already have that opportunity instilled in our calendar... Shabbat dinner. I would encourage us all to find opportunities for your family from Friday at Sunset to Saturday after dark to make that time feel like a holiday and I'd like to share two of our opportunities with you.

Our Cookie Minyan and Tot Shabbat Services are led by Rachel Thomas and

Yehudit Rubin. They provide Shabbat service opportunities for your children while, by leading by example, you can attend services in our main sanctuary or in our Havurah service on selected dates. Starting soon, we hope to incorporate additional learners minyanim as well.

By attending Cookie Minyan and/or Tot Shabbat services, which happen every week, we are able to instill the beauty of Shabbat in the midst of our weekly happenings to our children. And even though the professionals might not get a marvelous Cheshvan as a break we will get a marvelous Cheshvan by seeing our children celebrating and rejoicing in the holiday of Shabbat.

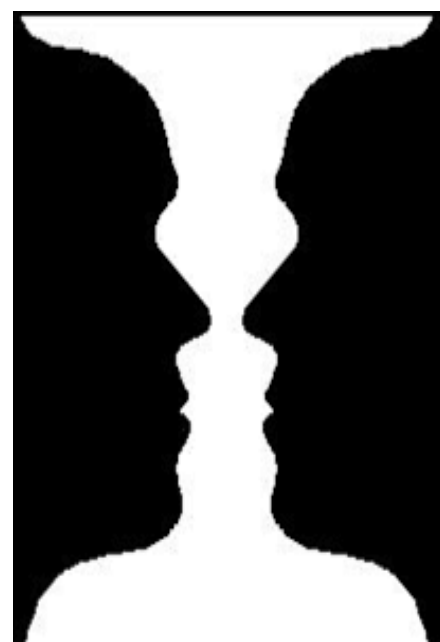

Imagine that I walk into your home and go directly to shelves lined with photo albums, if anyone still has those. If I selected and opened any one of them, I would likely find photos of you, your children and/or parents, great-grandparents and probably family pets, friends, sites and much more. I have often asked students to imagine just that. We discuss the dynamics, without getting too personal, where various relatives live, experiences with family, highlights of experiences with friends, family milestones, and the list goes on. This is how I introduce the book of Bereisheet, complete with family dynamics similar to some of our own, relatives living far away, animals that play important roles in our lives and lifecycle events. The Torah, our code for living Jewishly, is not a history book, and it is sometimes hard to convince youngsters that this is so. Even the family photo album, like Torah, is filled with each one's perception of what is in a photo and the memories and stories a photo or mental snapshot might evoke. We know that two people in one photo may remember the experience differently, one maybe fondly and one maybe not so fondly. This is highlighted when two people look at the same optical illusion. Do

you see a young lady or an older one? Do you see two silhouettes or a winecup?

These discussions happen in our classrooms on Shabbat School days as well as on other Religious School days. These conversations do not only occur among our students when directed by our staff. These conversations are also orchestrated for parents of Religious School students, and for any congregants who are interested, twice a month - once on zoom and once in person - with Michael Elkins at the helm, presenting texts and initiating lively dialogue. Please check synagogue communication for the schedule of these conversations with Michael Elkins for the coming year. Whatever your age or outlook, each year we find the topics, conversations, novel and inspired insights, which are parts of the process of carrying our Torah forward from one generation to the next.

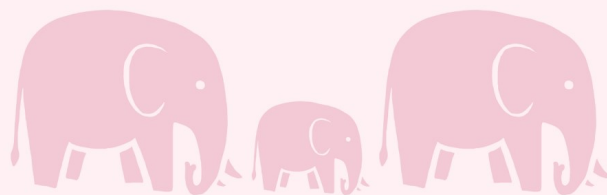

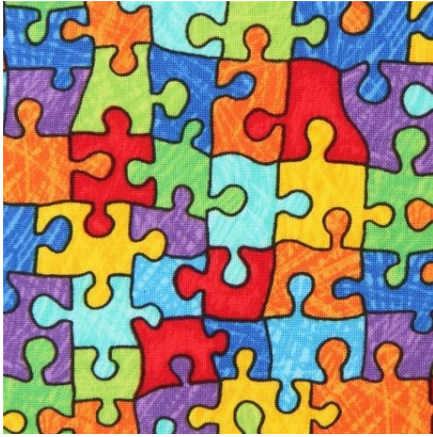
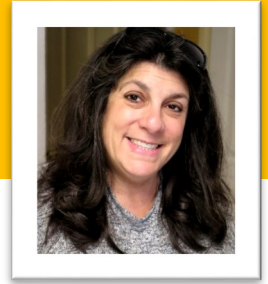

From the President of the Sisterhood

This past year, Sisterhood came together in many different ways, reaching a variety of demographics within our synagogue family. We recognize that we are stronger together with all pieces of the puzzle fitting together to create the whole. As the saying goes "The sum of all parts is greater than the whole." We, the sisterhood board, truly believe this to be the case.

In the Torah portion, Nitzavim, Moses gives one of his last speeches to the Israelites in preparation for their entering into the land of Israel. He implores them to stay true to the covenant with God. That they must heed God's teachings and God will provide them with prosperity. There will be consequences if they turn away from the covenant with God. Any transgressions will impact the entire community and the land. Moses continues to remind them that Israel's covenant with God includes everyone: tribal leaders, women, children, and even those resident non-Israelites who perform the most menial tasks. It also includes those who are present and those who are not present - the idea of future generations. Moses

implores the people that these instructions are vital for the peoples' well-being as well as easily understandable and attainable by all.

Although rabbinic traditions concerning who stood at Sinai do not explicitly refer to women, the midrash or explanation about this portion uses Exodus 19:3 to affirm the presence of women there. Women in the Torah are not always referred to specifically when mentioning all of Israel.

I bring up this particular portion because it specifically is read before Rosh Hashanah as we are all in our state of T'shuvah, returning on our path towards God and Judaism. We are returning to our synagogue sisterhood after a long year of restrictions. However, just like Moses made sure to include ALL of the people of Israel, Sisterhood includes all of the women in TBH-BE's community. Our goals include all of us on the Sisterhood board and you. We are better together. Each and every one of the women at TBH-BE are an important part of Sisterhood. You may attend one event or every event. You may chair an event or two or three, or not. However, without your input, participation, and support, we are not complete. Together we are better.

We hope you will join us for a Rosh Hodesh, Book Club, yoga or board meeting. Board meetings are

open to all members. Come find out what we are up to. Come find ways to get involved. November 9th we are having a hybrid Hanukkah Craft Activity night. Look for information to sign up. We hope you will find ways to become a part of the whole, supporting Sisterhood and TBH-BE.
