From the Rabbi's Study Rabbi Neil S. Cooper

Good Name

On the surface, it is an incredible story of a family, whose hard work, and success personified the American Dream. Isaac and Sophie Sackler were Jewish immigrants, arriving at Ellis Island from the Ukraine (formerly "Galicia"). In this Metropolitan Museum of Art, the land of opportunity, with initiative, hard work and desire, everyone, even Museum, and the British Museum, to Jews, could succeed. Isaac opened a grocery store in Brooklyn. Sophie and Isaac were blessed with three sons, born respectively in 1913, 1916 as well as the Sackler Faculty of and 1920. All three went to Medical School. All three became psychiatrists.

In 1952, two brothers bought a small pharmaceutical company. The other brother continued to practice medicine. But as the pharmaceutical business flourished and new possibilities for medications emerged, Arthur left his medical practice and joined Raymond and Frederick in a company which would become Purdue Pharma. Their good

fortune, their understanding of psychopharmacology and their business savvy elevated the Sackler Family to the highest levels of Money Cannot Buy the Crown of a wealth in this country. The Sackler name appeared on Forbes' list of the wealthiest families in the United States.

> And they were generous, The Sackler name also appears on buildings and in institutions from the great art museums in the world (the Guggenheim, the National History name a few), to the most elite universities (Harvard, Yale, Colombia, Oxford, and many more) Medicine at Tel Aviv University.

> The wealth of the Sacklers, it appears, came less from a legitimate pharmaceutical business' profits, and more from a business which created the medicine commonly known as OxyContin, a drug they knew was addictive. The most recent book by Patrick Radden Keefe, Empire of Pain: The Secret History of the Sackler Dynasty, released just a few weeks ago, in mid-April, details the Sackler family's implosion and fall

from the heights of prosperity and notoriety to the depths of disdain and disgrace.



The Sackler Family secret had two parts. The first part of the secret was the uncomfortable truth they kept from others, and which they continue to deny. It was their knowledge of the drug's addictive qualities. The second part of the secret was the Sacklers' insatiable desire for profits. That desire was so great, that they decided to encourage people to use their drug, at times providing free samples for a 30-day trial, knowing that those who used it would likely become addicted. That desire was greater than their concern for human life. By creating addicts, they could create business. There are currently more than 2600 lawsuits, most by states and insurance companies against the corporation and the members of the family, who have become billionaires.

The fraud was exposed and ultimately the truth came out. But what if the truth was never revealed? Could they have gotten away with this? Had they been more discreet or vigilant, might they have walked away admitting no responsibility? And what does it mean, to get away with it, anyway?

Their nefarious plan enabled the family members' to take billions from the company and hide it in offshore accounts while their company, Perdue Pharma, went into bankruptcy. Incredible as it may be, the family may retain their fortunes and never be held accountable by the justice system of this country. If so, have they gotten away with one of the greatest corporate crimes ever perpetrated. But if they are not convicted, which will not be determined for years, have they already gotten away with it? I say no for three reasons.

First, I believe, that no matter how loudly they insist they are innocent, no matter how many universities they support and how generous they may be, no matter their claim that they knew nothing, they know they are guilty, and they will always live with that guilt. In the quiet moments and places in their lives, they will remember those they helped to become addicts. In times of their joy, I believe that their souls will not be at ease. They will recall how

many died, how many families were torn apart. As they celebrate life, I believe that God makes certain that they live in perpetual, self-inflicted pain with torn and broken souls. At least I hope that will be the case. They have not "gotten away with it".

Second, they must live, knowing that the world in general shall look upon them and their family members with scorn. And, speaking personally, they must know that, regardless of their support of the Jewish Community, we are outraged at the nature and magnitude of the crime.

But my particular outrage is magnified by the fact that the family is Jewish. To be a Jew, as I understand it, means that those who possess the ability to help, help.

Those with the capacity to give and the strength to lift, lift and give; not to use their gifts, instead, to hurt those already in pain, to harm those already vulnerable and to manipulate a system of justice created to protect those who are guilty, while innocent victims languish.

And third, whether or not they are convicted, the Sackler name shall be, for some time, one of infamy. Their name shall be associated with the opioid crisis, it will be linked to a

family who, for 25 years, became the largest state sanctioned manufacturer of a drug whose ingredients include some of the most powerful and addictive drugs, all for a few dollars.

We read in the name of Rabbi Shimon:

There are three crowns: the crown of Torah, the crown of the Priesthood and the crown of Kingship. But the crown of a good name exceeds them all. (*Pirke Avot:4:17*)

Unlike the other crowns, the crown of a good name is ours to earn or to squander. Although the justice system may find them not guilty, the Sackler Family knows, that for the rest of their lives, the crown of a good name will never be theirs. That is a crown which money cannot buy. And that may be the most painful lesson they learn.

On Torah, On Service and On **Acts of Lovingkindness**

In Pirkei Avot 1:2, it is written:

הוּא הָיָה אוֹמֶר, עַל שָׁלשָׁה דְבָרִים הַעוֹלַם עוֹמֶד, עַל הַתּוֹרָה וְעַל הַעֲבוֹדָה ועל גּמִילוּת חַסָּדִים:

This quote, attributed to Shimon HaTzadik, is usually translated as: On three things the world stands, on Torah, on Service and on acts of lovingkindness. This past year in our Religious School, every parent, child and teacher can attest to how challenging it was to strive to achieve each in a meaningful way. First, as a stool needs all three legs on which to stand solidly, our Religious School population is comprised of parents, children and staff without any of whom we would topple.

Torah

Very soon, our fifth graders will be reading Torah for the very first time, having learned how to chant under the auspices of Hazzan Rosner who

met weekly with our students via zoom. Our seventh graders have been studying Torah diligently in preparation for their bar/bat mitzvah service. Many of our bnei mitzvah return on a regular basis to read as well, serving as role models for younger students and siblings. All of tzedaka, preparing mishloach manot, our students study the weekly Torah portions and become familiar with the various personalities through text in escape rooms and games during study, bibliodrama and other creative means.

Avodah

Avodah is translated as worship or service. Our classes were able to maintain a sense of community while engaging in services on Shabbat school as well as the weekdays. As always, our week began with havdala, the ceremony separating Shabbat from the rest of the week. This year, however, the only group able to chant the blessings were those who remained on zoom for the year. A highlight for our seventh graders this year was being able to actually go into the sanctuary to support their friends and participate in bar/bat mitzvah services.

Gemilut Chasadim

Gemilut chasadim, or acts of

lovingkindness, are so much easier to perform when there is no need for



physical distancing. We found ways. Whether it was writing and decorating cards for seniors, giving being kind to classmates, demonstrating good sportsmanship 'sleep unders', we don't wait to pay it forward. We jump on opportunities to initiate acts of lovingkindness.

Hopefully, we will take all of this forward into school year 5782!


