"Said Rav: 'The mitzvot were only given to refine human beings'" (Genesis Rabbah 44:1).

We all fail, we all have flaws, we all could be better and could use some refining. The Yamim Noraim, Rosh Hashanah, and Yom Kippur, are meant to teach us that we can always be better. We have made mistakes this year just as surely as all humans err, but there is no mistake that we cannot learn from and do our best to make right. Belief in teshuvah, repentance, is the dearest thing we have because, without it, we would have no hope of making our lives or our world better. The very fact of these holidays, as well as the fact of their dramatic attendance increase from an average Shabbat, reminds us that we are committed to being better in the year ahead.

While the commitment of refining ourselves is something we display on these holy days, the act of refining is a daily process that requires daily rituals and reminders. As the Midrash says, the mitzvot are our way of refining ourselves. Doing mitzvot, acting in accordance with the commandments of our Torah, refines us in many ways. Observing Jewish law helps us practice self-control, the lack of which is so often the thing that get us into trouble in the first place. Keeping kosher reminds me that I can live my life according to the values I hold. Mitzvot remind us that we can set goals and achieve them. When I struggle to schedule things I want into my day, I try to remind myself that I can make time to pray, and so I can also make time for family, working out, or calling a friend. Perhaps most importantly, the mitzvot remind us that we are connected to something larger than ourselves and that our desires and autonomy are sometimes subservient to a higher power. How much better off would our world be today if people remembered to subjugate their needs to those of the world around them? What kind of purpose could we feel if we remembered to make our actions just a little more holy this next year?

As we enter this new year, we make amends for the mistakes of the past and think about the better versions of ourselves that we want to be in the year to come. Let us each take to heart the words of our tradition, and let observance of mitzvot be a part of our plan towards refinement. This year, pick a mitzvah to take on, a daily or weekly ritual, or an aspect of Jewish practice to observe with intention and regularity. If this is new to you, then take time to learn the custom and meaning as you take on a new observance. If you are a regular observer, then make the commitment to practice with greater *kavanah*, intention and explore how the mitzvah can refine you over the year. I will be doing the same, and I am always available as a resource and a cheerleader, please do share your stories and experiences with me.

It is always incredibly meaningful for me to be able to share our holidays with them, just as they share theirs with us.

As we turn the page to 5784, may you and your family be blessed with the wisdom and memories of old traditions as well as the appetite to start new ones. Kari, Eddie, Alex, and I wish you all a healthy and sweet new year.

There was a fire in an attic two houses down from us this summer. The bedtime story I was reading to Matan that evening came to life with multiple fire trucks, ambulances, ladders, hoses, 30 firefighters, and police showing up just outside our window. With all the distractions, sleep would be impossible, so we went out to watch.

I was impressed by the amazing work from the emergency response team, but I was surprised at the end of the evening. After the fire was safely under control, the fire chief approached the homeowners, who were at that point sitting with their two kids in a neighbor's driveway, and said, "I have to get your statement." In no way discounting the response team's hard work, I couldn't help but think that there must be a better way to approach such a delicate situation. The family had just gone through such a traumatic experience, and they weren't first comforted, reassured, or supported by the professionals on site?

Instead, it was the neighbors who focused on the family's personal and emotional needs—bringing out chairs and water for them, helping to make sure the family had a place to stay for the evening, that the kids had lunches made for school the next day, and clothes to wear. Our synagogue has a wonderful professional team, no doubt. Nevertheless, with the rapidly growing membership, our small staff cannot accomplish what an entire community can.

When you receive an email about a new baby or a congregant going through a loss

I hope we all go into this year thinking of being a first responder in our TBH-BE community and how we can come together to continue growing from strength to strength.

Who said empty-nesters and teens have nothing in common? We just concluded four years of very successful intergenerational programming at Temple Beth Hillel-Beth El, where the sixth and seventh graders in our community have learned from the wisdom of empty-nesters, and the empty-nesters have had a chance to forge new connections. I am thrilled to announce that we will continue this most worthy endeavor! For all involved in the programming these past four years, it was clear that, "יטוֹבֶים הֵשְׁנֵים מְּךְ־הָאֶתֶד". As it is written in Kohelet 4:9, two are better than one. The verse goes on to talk about earnings. Our earnings are not tangible, though. Our earnings are in the form of laughter, joy, camaraderie, and relationship building, all present each time we get together.

Our Religious School students in sixth and seventh grades, and sometimes our alums in higher grades, have gotten together with empty-nesters in our congregation at least once a month.
