## From the Rabbi's Study Rabbi Neil S. Cooper

#### A Garden Path

have been doing a lot of work in my yard. At the beginning of the summer, had you driven by Lori's and my house, you may have seen me weeding or planting. Over the course of several weeks, however, if you did not see me as you drove by, I was probably working in the backyard. This year, in fact, I focused most of my yardwork there.

Early in the spring, while spending a great deal of time at home, as per COVID prevention guidelines, I would often look into my yard longingly, and say to myself, "Soon, you'll be able to spend more time outside and do that project you have been waiting to do". Truth be told, there was not a specific project I had in mind. I simply felt the need to get outside and do something to improve the backyard. And, after investing several hours surfing through "Pinterest", I decided to make a garden path.

A path, I thought, was a great idea. It would add beauty and character to our rather generic and unadorned yard. The flowers I had hoped to see, the beautiful colors and scents of summer I had missed, could be incorporated on and around my new path. Shortly after Pesach, I began to make a plan and gather materials.

The path, including a small sitting

area at one end, would be created using Belgian red granite bricks. No two were exactly the same size. Those variations in the dimensions made this project particularly challenging. In addition, each brick weighed about 30 lbs. When a forklift dropped a pallet of 140 bricks at the end of the driveway, I swallowed hard, experiencing my first doubts about my ability to complete this project.

The process required to make a path is neither simple nor easy. Once measured, laid out and fully planned, I was required to dig the path through the yard, 8" deep. The winding path was a total of about 50' in length, which meant that I needed to dig through more than seven cubic yards of soil. Did you wonder where I was going to put seven or eight cubic yards of topsoil? Neither did I.

Each brick was individually laid, leveled and oriented relative to the brick on either side, before and behind. Once laid, pebbles first then sand were used to anchor the stones. Suffice to say, like most of my projects, this one turned out more difficult and far more time consuming than anticipated. But it was worth the trouble. I now have a beautiful path! Lori loved it. But seeing it for the first time, she asked: "Where does it go?" "Nowhere in particular". "Well, if the path isn't going somewhere, why did we need a path?" "Good question. I'll get back to you on that".

I thought about that question when it was posed. I am thinking about it still as we near the High Holidays. Why did I put so much work, sweat and energy

into a path leading nowhere? I suppose, the answer is that the project itself, not the end-point of the path, was the goal. The project was an exercise in planning a direction, placing stones, and taking a few steps along the way. There was no destination, only a beginning and a direction. And, in that regard, the path is an appropriate image, particularly this year, as we approach the High Holidays.

These High Holidays, as you know, will be my final ones as your rabbi. Where will I go from here? What is my goal for the next chapter of my life? I am not quite sure. It is likely that, assuming my back holds out, I'll do some more gardening. I'll become involved in some other projects, I am sure. But, standing at the precipice of a New Year, I look back and take note of a path I have helped to create. The bricks are secure and well anchored. The direction is clear, but the destination has yet to be determined. Perhaps that will become clear as the path continues to be constructed. For now, however, the end is not in sight.

I am glad that I spent the time, the energy, and the muscle required to get us to where we are. I am proud of the work which has been completed and anxious to see where this path goes from here. But, even without a visible endpoint, I take comfort in the words of Rabbi Tarfon: Lo 'alecha ha-m'lacha ligmor, v'lo ata ben chorin li'hibatel me'mena/ It may not be your responsibility to finish the work. Yet neither are you exempt from beginning it. (Pirkei Avot 2:21)

During the coming year, we will still walk on the path we have built together, even though we are not certain where this will ultimately lead us. Amidst the uncertainty of the future is the comfort and pleasure I find in this moment, as we continue, at least for the time being, to walk together.

May the New Year bring to us all a

path leading to a future of joy, health and fulfillment, for us, for our families and for all people.

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## From our Rabbinic Intern Jonathon Adler

#### Meet Our Rabbinic Intern!

Shalom aleichem! My name is Jonathon Adler, and I am incredibly excited and honored to be your rabbinic intern for 5782.

Among the many things I find remarkable about Talmud Torah, the age-old Jewish tradition of studying our written (Torah) and oral (Talmud) texts, is that fact that these texts, the stories of our ancestors, our prophets, and our sages, still resonate. They impart lessons today, thousands of years after they were first written. Every year during the High Holidays, for example, we read -- and learn from -- the story of Akedah, the binding of Isaac, told in Chapter 22 of the Book of Genesis.

God tests Abraham by instructing him to take his beloved son, Isaac, up into the mountains and sacrifice him. Isaac is old enough to be concerned. He carries the wood and the flint to light the fire upon the altar they will make. "But where," he asks, "is the sheep for the burnt offering?"

"God will see to the sheep for the offering, my son," Abraham replies. And at the last possible moment, just as Abraham raises his knife to slaughter his son, an angel intervenes. God provides a ram for the offering, and Isaac grows up and goes on to marry Rebecca and father Jacob and Esau.

There is much we can learn from this story. We see how Abraham behaves when he is tested by God. We learn that following God's will is, perhaps, more important to Abraham than his love for his son and, some might argue, his wife. The Bible mentions no interactions between Abraham and Sarah after the Akeidah; Sarah's response to the story is devastation; a Midrash in Pirkei de Rabbi Eliezer tells us that upon receiving the news, Sarah's soul left her body. Indeed, the next chapter of the Torah begins with her death.

The Akedah is a difficult story, but I also find hope in it: God will provide, even in dark moments. Although it is often easy to see the hard part of the test, we may not always realize that our hand has been stayed. We might not understand what, exactly, God is giving us. At times like this, however, as we prepare for the New Year, we have a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the tests we have endured.

As we emerge from quarantine and approach the High Holidays, this time of selfreflection and renewal, we must remember one of the key themes of the holidays is *Teshuvah*, which means repentance but also *return*. So, what are we returning to? For some, the upcoming High Holidays will mark a physical return to the synagogue. Are we returning to something that has changed, as we ourselves have during these trying times? Like



Abraham, we have been tested. Now, we have been gifted with this proverbial ram in the thicket, an opportunity for *teshuvah*, for return: a clean slate for 5782.

So as we enter this time of return and introspection, and as we mourn those we have lost both during the pandemic and before it, take time to reflect on what we bring with us as we enter the New Year, and on how much Torah, God-willing, we will get to learn in the year to come. I look forward to sharing Torah, music, challah, and more with you during my time as your rabbinic intern.

### From the Cantor's Study

#### Hazzan Eugene Rosner

hose of you who are musically astute will recognize a special melody I use for the beginning of the Festival Morning Kedusha. When I begin n'kadesh et shimcha baolam, I use the mi sinai tune Tzena Urena. This tune is connected to a piyyut (found in the festival morning service), written in the Middle Ages, by a Paytan, a poet, usually the Hazzan, at that time. It was his task to come up with piyyutim on a regular basis. The Goldschmidt Machzor, a copy of which is found in the rare books collection at the Jewish Theological Seminary, includes this piyyut and many others. This piyyut and many others are no longer in our modern prayerbooks, but that doesn't mean the mi sinai tune has to disappear along with it. A way to preserve this most-precious melody (those of you who have heard it must agree!) is by using it in an alternative text. The nearby Kedusha made most sense. The parsing of the opening lines (I use it for az b'kol ra'ash gadol) matches the tunes' melodic phrasing—a perfect match! A mi sinai tune is rescued!

In July, a similar situation presented itself. For many years, when I was chanting chapter 1 of Lamentations during Tisha B'av services, I made sure to chant verse 16 with the mi sinai tune Al Eleh Ani Vochia (for these things I cry). It is a powerful nusach tradition, with an equally powerful melody. But why limit the the mi sinai tune to this one spot where it could be thematically used elsewhere? The melody divides into 4 phrases. I reviewed chapter 2 which I knew I was going to do. As is custom for Lamentations, the majority of the liturgy is parsed in triplicate form, but there is the occasional 4-part phrasing, in particular, verses 2, 15, and 19! So, I will pepper the reading with this special melody in those verses! These melodies are very special. The more we can appropriately hear them, the better.

Personally, one of the greatest draws to the High Holy Days, is a treasure trove of incredibly important mi sinai tunes. What makes them so important is that we can date their origins and their continual use throughout Ashkenazic communities, often as far back as 800 years! What a terrible shame it would be if they were to vanish into history. This is why I've made it a top priority to keep this musical tradition alive in

my many years here at TBH-BE. Walking down the Cardo, in the Old City of Jerusalem, one can peer down one of the several archeological shafts and see layers from the 2nd temple. Looking down a little further, you will see remnants from the 1st temple! That gives me the shivers. In the same way, the 800-year-old music of Aleinu (from the musaf service) and v'hakohanim (from the Yom Kippur Avodah

service), gives me great pause. This



is our very special music, that we can sing, preserve, enjoy, and enhance our prayer-filled moments. (Four musical examples can be found at the bottom of this page https://www.tbhbe.org/ fromcantorrosner )




